# **CCC** hosts contest

The annual State Championship Plymouth/AAA Troubleshooting Contest for high school students was hosted by Clackamas Community College, May 13.

All other high schools took fourth place, except for Red-mond, which didn't show up. View, Jim Demanett and Michael Ralston from Cottage Grove, Joe Ostling and Jim Becker from Newport, Sean Murphy and Rowan Nicklous from Lebanon.

The competition started at 10 a.m. on the CCC track, where

## Shaw's play opens May 28


"Fanny's First Play" by George Bernard Shaw opens May 28 for a two-weekend run at McLoughlin Hall Theatre.
