Personal records set as CCC takes 3rd in meet

The Cougar team moved up in a dark horse showing to capture third place at the Region IV Track and Field Championships, hosted by Lane Community College Friday and Saturday, May 15 and 16.

Competing for Clackamas in the opening event, Brian Johnson faced a brisk wind to throw the javelin 171' 6". Jeanne Barnett and Christa Caraher battled the wind up the far side of the track for personal records (PR) in the women's 10,000 meter race. Barnett placed first.

Both Keith Kimberlin and Jed Wachlin ran in the 110 meter hurdles trials. Kimberlin set a PR at 16.26 seconds. Eric Christen took first in the 400 meter trials in heat one while Randy Lynch ran for Clackamas in the second heat trials.

Running into the wind Rich Flemmer took 6'4" in the high jump finals and Christen made a season's best long jump of 22'8 1/2".

Running nearly three abreast in the 100-meter dash trials, Andre Scott, Jeff Faust and Ken Griffin competed for the

Cougars. Scott placed first in the trials. In the 400 hurdles trials Wachlin ran in the first heat followed by Rick Hanson in heat two.

In the 200 meter dash trials

Christen ran in heat one and Faust set a PR in the second heat. Jim Baker tossed the discus 130'4" to place third in the finals.

Saturday's sunshine brought opening and closing victories for the Cougars. Despite a hesitation at the first water jump, Mike Smith took first with teammate Scott Sheldon packing a second for a one-two finish in the 3,000 meter steeple chase.

Dena Raddle placed fourth for the women and Greg Suiter placed second for the men. Mike Carson also competed for Clackamas in the 1500.

Christen competed in the triple jump with 43'3 1/2". Andre Scott took fourth in the 100 meter dash. In the men's 800, Jack Kegg placed fourth for the Cougars and teammate Rick Hanson placed third in the 400 meter hurdles.

Molly McAtor ran in the 800

hurdle Kimberlin took fourth with a PR of 16.20 seconds. In the men's 5,000 meter, Mike Smith placed third running with teammate Sheldon closing in one of the most exciting events of the day. Clackamas men stormed across the line in the 1600 meter relay, leaving the crowd cheering and seven other community college teams with something to think about for next year. The Cougars placed first in the final event.

In the fourth inning, Lane got two solo home runs from Rod Johnson and Scott Smith. In the bottom of the fourth, the Cougars' Tony Ogels batted Kirkpatrick and Scott Brown across the plate, but the margin remained and Clackamas came in one run short.

After the dust had cleared, the team that didn't seem ready to play, had split the double-header and would go back home on the van, possibly joking, poking fun at a teammate, or maybe even taking a health quiz.
