Going overseas helpful

"Either work abroad or study abroad is a good thing to have in one's resume. It shows the student is willing to be adventurous," stated Magdalena Ladd, chairperson international education-foreign languages, about going overseas for college students.

International Cooperative Education program, which is offered by Clackamas Community College, provides students with the opportunity to work in a foreign country and live with a host family.

The college works through the Northwest International Education Association, which is dedicated to the promotion of international and intercultural education. They are comprised of over 30 colleges and universities in the Western United

"It's a good worthwhile program. We have students who have participated in it and felt

good about it. They had an international experience. These students recommended the program," Ladd expressed.

Students who decide to work abroad can even earn academic credit for it. Many of the work positions include room and board, a stipend, or regular Sixty positions are available for eight to ten weeks across Europe, Asia and the

Many positions do not require foreign language, but for some, students need to be enrolled in a foreign language class, or have studied a foreign language in high school.

Students also have the possibility to study abroad. There are programs to go to France, Spain, or a German speaking country. To go to France will be in the summer quarter from June 10-July 22, and students will have the opportunity to live in a French home, attend the international Music and Theater festivals, and take courses in college.

In summer '88 there is also

the possibility to go to Spain, and study at The Center for Cross-Cultural Study in Seville, Spain. The study is divided up in two sessions, from which the first one goes from June 8-28, and the second one goes from June 29-July 19. The trip includes a vacation on the Costa del Sol July 21-27 at the end of the course.

Students also have the opportunity to go to Austria and Germany for a nine week summer program, and study at a college.

Students who will participate in one of those programs will have the opportunity to study the alues, religion, politics, history, art, and music of the people in another country. Prior to the summer experience, classes, seminars and meetings will familiarize students with the country's social customs and language.


1. All classes which have the first meeting of the week on Monday, Wednesday or Friday, will have the final exam as indicated by the class HOUR and M.
