### Voter registration drive

Associated Student Government is sponsoring a Voter Registration Drive Winter Term.

Registration cards are available at the college bookstore and in the Community Center. The cards can be turned in at the Student Activities office in the Community Center or can be mailed to the appropriate county elections department.

The registration drive is a part of the college's March 22 property tax levy campaign.

According to figures compiled by Lee Fawcett, Assistant

Dean of Student Services, only 23 percent of the College's students voted in the November levy election.

### ASG openings

Three ASG Senator positions are now open. Denise Camp resigned as ASG Assistant to the President Senator to accept full time employment and ASG Entertainment Senator Marc Collet withdrew from classes at CCC. One Position was never filled from Fall Term.

There are two ASG Entertainment Senator positions open. The duties include assisting the Entertainment coordinator in selecting and

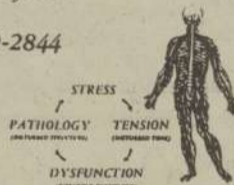
