

Woo finds teaching Tae Kwon Do at CCC enjoyable

Jaihan Woo, Tae Kwon Do instructor here at CCC, is a native of Seoul, Korea and has been teaching courses here for the past five years.

Woo began taking organized classroom Tae Kwon Do Karate at the age of eight.

"The 50's and 60's were rough," said Woo. It was a time when slavery was legal and interracial discrimination was prominent in Woo's native country.

Woo came to America to escape the discrimination and civil unrest of his homeland.

In 1975, Woo joined the U.S. Army and began his teaching career as a Tae Kwon Do instructor. During his tour with the Army, he traveled to New Mexico, Louisiana, and Hawaii.

After finishing his tour of duty with the Army, Woo and his wife opened a dry cleaning business here in Oregon.

Five years ago, Woo decided to return to teaching, and came to CCC as the Tae Kwon Do instructor. During his first years at CCC he was not only a teacher, but also attended classes as a student.

He sees CCC as "A great place to start a career."

His plans for the future include opening his own martial arts studio in the Oregon City area, where instruction will be given on group and individual levels.

"When I go into the class, for an hour or two I am dedicated and concentrate only on Tae Kwon Do," said Woo. "I see about 60 percent of the students are really serious, the other 40 percent are there for the credit or just a good workout."

Woo sees competitive potential in a few of his students and is hoping to train and send them to the 1992 Olympic Games.

ASG acquires behavior code

The Associated Student Government here at CCC has adopted a behavior code for its officers.

The behavior code reads:

1. Dishonesty will not be allowed.
2. Forgery, alteration, or misuse of college documents or of identification is not allowed.
3. Theft or damage to property is not allowed.
4. Unauthorized entry or occupancy of college facilities is not allowed.
5. Unauthorized use of college supplies, equipment, and funds is not allowed.
6. Illegal use, possession, or distribution of drugs is not allowed anywhere.
7. Use or possession of alcoholic beverages on college property or appearance on campus at any college-sponsored event is not allowed.
8. Use or possession of alcoholic beverages at any college sponsored event off campus is restricted to students of legal age and to those times when the event is not formally in session.
9. Disorderly conduct, or obscene conduct or expression is not allowed.
10. Possession or use of firearms, explosives, dangerous chemicals, substances, or instru-

ments which can be used to inflict bodily harm on any individuals or damage to buildings or college grounds is not allowed.

11. Initiations are not allowed.

While all this may just sound

rules were set down so that "everyone is treated fair."

Taylor also explained that although the behavior code is at present limited to ASG officers, other clubs may adopt it if they wish.
