Sculpture with mixed fiber (yarn) and drawings will be the subject of the Jiebmann/LaRue workshop from noon to 2 p.m. Dec. 7. Coghill's workshop on Fetish Dolls will be on Dec. 8 from 3 to 5 p.m. Bronson, on Dec. 9 from 2 to 4 p.m. will have a workshop in enamel, and Cooke's workshop on Dec. 10 from 2 to 4 p.m. will consist of painting on canvas tarp and paper.

Also, Coghill will critique the exhibit entitled "The Liberated Canvas" on display at the Clackamas County Courthouse in Oregon City during the week.
