
but newcomers are welcome.

berline for \$7.85 consisting of Oregon Chinook Salmon baked with eggs, mush-rooms and seasoned rice in a flaky dough crust. Veal oscar, chicken and steak can also be found on the menu. Hours for the dining room are noon to 2 p.m. for lunch and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. for dinner. The Ski Deli can be sought for snacks including hot dogs and soft beverages. The Blue Ox room is a cavernous bar at the lodge serving cocktails, beer and wine from noon to 6 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.
