Hoopsters record third win

In basketball action last Friday the Clackamas Community College basketball team edged by Multnomah School of the Bible, 9-78.

Within the first two minutes of the game, the CCC roundballers jumped ahead to build the biggest point spread of the first half, 8-2.

Throughout the remainder of the beginning half of the game, the lead was continually jockeyed between the teams with MSB leading 38-43 when the teams went into the locker rooms.

In the second half of play, the Cougars had to make a comeback as they continu-

ally fell behind early in the second half, 42-51.

Charles Sampson and Ken Mellum answered the Cougar's needs. Sampson scored 17 points and grabbed 12 rebounds in the second half of play, Mellum scored 10 points, completing five out of six shots.

Sampson put Clackamas in the lead with just 3:25 left in the game, with a three-point play. MSB then scored making the tally, 77-76.

In the final minutes of the game both teams missed vital shots at the free throw line. Then Sampson, with just 10 seconds to go, made both baskets on a one-on-one foul shot, thus clinching the game for the Cougars.

Sampson led the scoring for the game with 22 points. He also grabbed 16 rebounds.

Bill Ullman contributed 16 points and nine rebounds. He was successful in seven out of 11 attempts.

Dan Bauer also played an excellent game by accumulating 14 points during the game.

In shot percentage, the Cougars also bettered their opponents. The Cougars' percentage was .469 (31/66) while MSB came up with .425 (34/80).

The victory gave the Cougars a 3-0 season record.

The Cougars face one of their toughest opponents this weekend as they come up against the Saints of Mt. Hood CC.

They will be playing the Saints at the Gresham School's home turf, 9 p.m. Friday.

CCC offers ski classes

Skiing classes will be offered to those interested during winter term at Clackamas Community College. Although instructor listed in the class description is Dale McGriff, in reality the class will be taught by members of the Mt. Hood ski school at Mt. Hood Meadows.

There will be ten classes throughout the term, on Wednesday nights (7-10) or Sunday afternoons (12-3) for downhill skiers, and on Saturday afternoons (12-3) for cross country skiers.

The cost of the classes will be \$26 to be paid at the time of registration. "A little over \$2 per lesson is a pretty good bargain for ski lessons," according to McGriff. Students will also receive discounts on their lift tickets and special rates on any rental equipment.

Once in the class the instructors will divide the group into various levels of performance so that those who already know the fundamentals won't have to spend time reviewing.

CCC will be handling the class from an organizational point of view. They will take care of recording the grades and credits. The ski instructors will handle the actual grading.

Unfortunately the college cannot offer transportation to the classes. CCC tried once before to have a bus take interested skiers to the mountain but it wasn't successful, so students will have to find their own means of transportation.

Still, the price of the lessons isn't much and with the special student discounts, the class looks to be one of the best bargains around for those interested in learning how to ski or in bettering their skiing abilities.

Those who are interested in taking the class, there will be a meeting during the first week of winter term in room 12 of Randall Hall where all questions will be answered, or feel free to question Dale McGriff on the matter.

Survival course slated

Northwest Outward Bound is now enrolling students in eight and 21-day winter mountaineering courses which will be held during January, February and March in the Wallowa Mountains of northeastern Oregon.

The courses provide instruction in cross-country skiing, winter camping and winter peak climbing skills. Participants do not need special equipment or previous experience in outdoor activities. The school supplies all equipment, food and instruction.

Students provide basic personal clothing and boots.

Winter courses are open to women and men, 18 and older for the 21-day courses and 21 and older for the eight-day courses.
