We are low income residents of Clackamas County. We have experienced great frustration in dealing with agencies and support services whose purpose is to help low income people. We are looking for other people who are feeling this frustration and are willing to work to make some changes.

We have gathered some information about a group of low income people in Roseburg who set up and control their own program of support services. We are hopeful that people in Clackamas County would be able to develop a similar program. We have met with representatives from Head Start, CC Community Action, Welfare, WIN, Clackamas Community College, etc. We have also met with other low income people who are interested in the program. The agencies are willing to work with us as resources to create our program, but we must be the ones to design, develop and control what we want.

After our visit to Roseburg Friday we will need to identify low income people in this community who are willing to put time and energy into the creation of a program whose purpose will be to serve themselves and other low-income people.

We have a house located behind Smuckers that has been accepted from the college to be used for Project Independence.

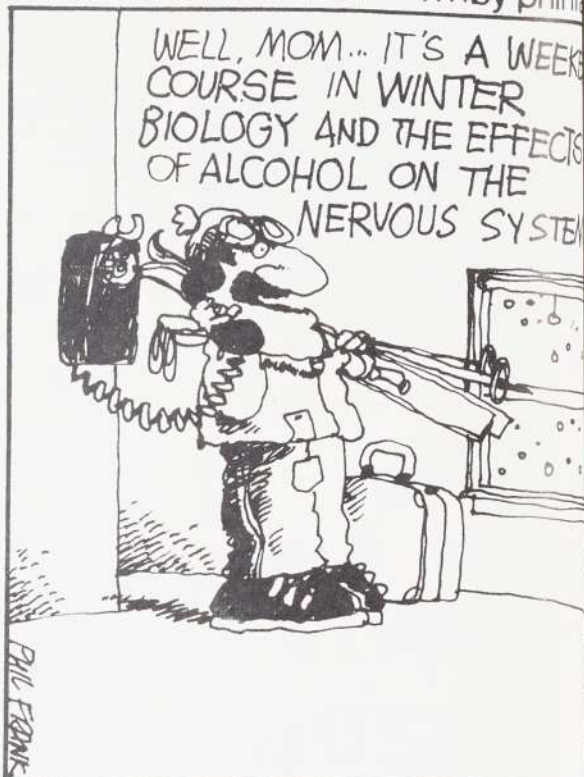
