

# Grapplers lose first

The Clackamas Community College wrestlers, ranked fifth nationally, suffered their first dual defeat of the season last Friday, as they lost to the University of Oregon J.V.'s 8-15.

The U of O Ducks, recovering from their 3-9 trouncing at the hands of the University of Washington, sent five members from their varsity team in an attempt to throw the Cougars off.

It wasn't all easy for the Ducks. It came down to the last two matches, when leading 4-11, both undefeated Cougars Joe Davis and Rich Holliman were beaten and the match was over.

The problem was not in the effort, but

rather in the size of the team as the Cougars were missing three of their starters.

The weekend action wasn't a total loss as the Cougars defeated tough teams from Lane Community College and Central Oregon Community College.

Against Lane on Friday night, the Cougars won all but one match as they literally ran away with the meet in the Cougars' last home match of the season.

The following evening, the Cougars looked worn as they barely got by Central Oregon Community College.

"We were just plain tired. I mean, it's hard to keep up after wrestling three matches in two nights," said Coach Norm Berney.

Again the Cougars were short on men as Tom Zeigle was out of the lineup with an arm injury and is expected to be out of action until Saturday's match with North Idaho.

Yet the biggest surprise of the week was the way the CCC squad handled Mt. Hood on Tuesday night. Expected to be one of the toughest matches of the season, the fired up Cougars won all ten matches beating Mt. Hood 44-0.

Termed by Berney as one of the best team performances he has seen since he came to Clackamas, the Cougars completely dominated their rivals as they didn't allow Mt. Hood a single takedown.

Four CCC members earned falls and two got major decisions. Rich Holliman pinned his opponent in just 25 seconds.

Putting in individual efforts for the week were Steve Morris and Rocky Schneider.

Morris, Clackamas' number one man at 150 pounds, wrestled four strong matches as he remained undefeated (19-0) for the season.

Schneider was superb during the week as he pinned his opponent in three out of four matches, winning all four. Considered by Berney to be "one of the best men we've got out there", Schneider won despite tough opposition.

Schneider beat the U of O J.V. team captain who is also a varsity member. He also defeated Tim Burnett of Central Oregon CC, who took third in regionals and competed in the nationals.

As the Cougars enter what Berney calls "the toughest week in the school's history," the team got some good news. Returning to action will be Jeff Harmon and Kim Roehl, who have been out the last couple of weeks with injuries.

The final week's action looks like this: Willamette's varsity on Friday, and number two ranked North Idaho on Saturday. "This week will really determine how good a team we really are," said Berney.

## Women establish records

The Clackamas Community College women's track team traveled to Seattle over the weekend and set three school records at the meet at the University of Washington.

In the 60-yard hurdles, Barbara Johnson paced to a quick 8.7 second school record for the Cougars against some of the "finest talent in the northern part of the continent," said Coach Roger Smith.

Tammy Likens established a CCC record in the quarter-mile run with a 65.5 first place finish in her heat.

Shot putter Karen Iiams took second place in her event with a 38.9½ toss -- also a new school record for the young Cougar team.

"An extra-strong showing in the mile race" was accredited to Jean Sandwick by Smith, who also added, "All the runners

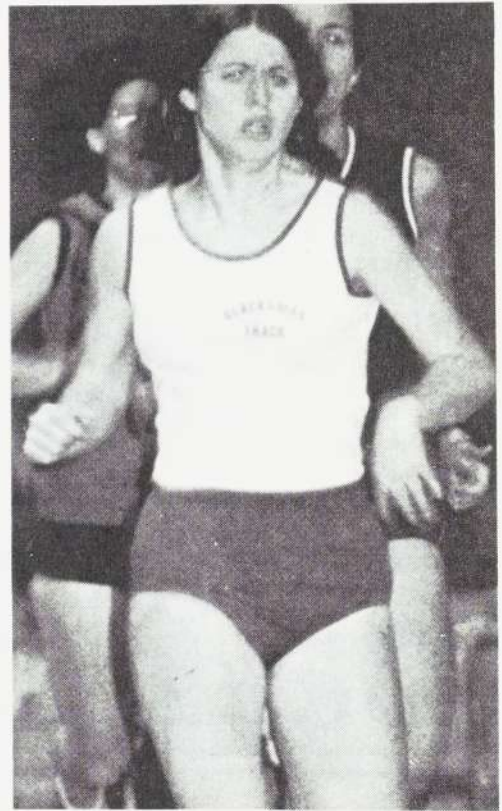
who placed in the mile race were tops in the junior college division."

Verna Simon placed seventh overall in the long jump and turned in a "good performance in the hurdles," said Smith.

Sandy Kilian turned in a life-best in the mile race with her 5.53.0.

Commenting on the 880 relay team of Verna Simon, Tammy Likens, Barb Johnson, and Amanda Eggleston, Smith said they "looked pretty strong for not having much practice beforehand." The relay placed fourth in its heat.

Shot putter Dale Veith was the only contingent from the men's track squad to make the trip up to Seattle. However, due to problems with his wrist, Veith had to sidestep much of the competition.
