Sunday rec going strong

The Clackamas Community College Community Services Department's Recreation Sunday program is in full swing with more than 150 people using the college's athletic facilities each weekend.

The program, which will continue through April, is designed to provide the public with indoor recreational facilities during the winter, free of charge. The program is located in Randall Hall.

People participating in the program range from age five to 55, but there are no limits. Among the activities offered are basketball, volleyball, badminton, wrestling, jogging, tumbling, karate, ping pong, and pool.

Volleyball and badminton are scheduled for 2:30 to 4 p.m. and basketball and wrestling from 4 to 6 p.m. The weight room and sauna are available from 2:30 to 6 p.m. but you must sign up ahead for the sauna.

The basketball competition is broken down into several areas with courts set aside for grade school, high school and older players.

Participants are urged to bring gym clothes and rubber-soled shoes. Clackamas Community College will furnish all equipment except for basketballs.

Don Zellner finally got things going for Clackamas with a 3-1 decision over North Idaho's Dale Rekow in the 142-pound class.

Steve Morris kept the momentum going with a 15-9 decision over Don Owen. The victory allowed Morris to finish the regular season undefeated with a 22-0-1 record.

Rocky Schneider was upended by Paul Hamilton at 158 by a 10-3 score. Hamilton finished fourth in nationals last season.

The Clackamas Community College baseball team, with strong returning players coupled with outstanding new talent, appear to be headed for a successful season this spring.

"We are a lot deeper talent wise than we were last year," Clackamas coach Gene Peterson said. "We should do well this year."

There are about 30 players out for the team this year with eight players back from last year's team. Mike Baker and Bob Simril are back as the top pitchers. Two returning infielders, Rick Jones and Tim Wach, will provide stability for this year's team. Tim Mills and J.B. Burton are the returning out-

fielders.

Two outstanding new players to the Cougar squad has this year are Greg Cusack and Mickey Wilson. Cusack was an All-Star player for Clackamas High School and he and Wilson should provide the Cougars with plenty of fire power.

Wilson is an all-stater from Tigard High School and played for the Cougars years ago. He is returning this year after sitting out a year.

Coach Peterson said that Lincoln and Umpqua will be the three best teams in the league but he is confident about the upcoming season.

With the regular season finally over, the Cougars can now look forward to the community college state championships at Lane CC on Feb. 18. The Cougars are seven-time defending state champions.

Berney is looking for a strong performance at Eugene and said the team should be strong in the regionals if the team can stay healthy.
