## Skill improvement

Clackamas Community College's Spring Term offerings will include more than 70 skill improvement classes ranging from bee management for profit, to graphic arts production to chain saw maintenance and repair.

Classes will be offered days and evenings at locations throughout Clackamas County.

Registration will be open through April 8 for most classes, according to Baird Langworthy, coordinator for the program.

Bookkeeping and Records and Money Management are two courses designed for the operator of a small business. Land Use Planning, Building and School Plant Operation, Secretarial Refresher and Successful Salesmanship are a few specialty courses on the schedule.

Technical classes such as Welding; Machine Shop; Plant Identification, Growth and Use; Small Engine Repair and Sheet Metal are being offered spring quarter.

Supervisors may be interested in classes on Communication Skills: written, Drug and Alcohol Use in Industry, Principles of Supervision and Human Relations.

## Vet changes

Recent changes in G.I. Bill legislation will affect veteran students and dependents attending colleges and vocational schools in Oregon. The new legislation, effective June 1, 1977, eliminates prepayment of the monthly education allowance.

For those students continuously enrolled through summer, their last check issued under the present prepayment system will be on May 1, 1977, for the month of May. The students' next check, for the month of June, will be issued on July 1, 1977.

Students enrolled through the partial month of June will receive payment during the latter part of June or early in the following month. Further information is available through the Veterans' Administration counseling office in CC-115.

## Summer jobs

Summer jobs may be available for Clackamas Community College students who, even with financial aid, will not be able to meet next year's school expenses.

The full-time summer jobs will be part of the college work-study program and will allow exceptionally needy students to build up savings which will be used to meet next year's school costs.

The Financial Aids Office stresses that the program is not designed to help students who are looking for a way to meet summer living expenses.

To apply for this program, students must complete a Financial Aid Package and talk to a financial aids counselor. Students who have not filled out their 1977-78 aid applications must do so right away.

It will take two to four weeks to determine eligibility and some job interviews will start soon.

## Library hours

Spring term has arrived and once again the library is working to make things convenient for students.

Library hours are 7:45 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Friday. The library will be closed on Saturday and Sunday.

Students are reminded that book renewals can be made by telephone if there are any conflicts in getting to the library. Also there is a bookdrop outside the bookstore for students to use when the library is closed and books are due.

The bookdrop is on the Randall Hall side of the bookstore and books can be dropped there on weekends or evenings when the library is closed.

## Keep-well clinics

The first in a county-wide health maintenance program of Keep-Well for senior citizens is scheduled to be held in Oregon City, April 12 and 13, 11:30 a.m. free.

The clinics will provide testing pressure and pulse, urinalysis, cholesterol testing and blood tests for hemoglobin and blood sugar. Results of the tests, if any, will be forwarded to the physicians.

Seniors will also receive counseling on medication, diet and nutrition from health nurses who will conduct the clinics.

The clinics will be held on a rotating basis throughout Clackamas County: Canby, Milwaukie, Estacada, Wilson, Molalla.
