CCC hosts frisbee competition

Clackamas Community College is the western regional competitor Association of College Union-Intercollegiate frisbee championship Saturday, April 23, beginning at 10 a.m.

The ACU-I competition will feature two men and two women from Region 14, which includes Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, and western Canada.

Clackamas held its campus qualifier day, April 12. Nathan Williams took place honors, amassing 24 points. Second place went to Leo Morini who took 20 points. Jeff Holland earned 20 points for his third place finish and will be the alternate.

The contest was judged on accuracy and distance. Throws were taken at a height of 10 ft. away from three positions. Seven throws were allowed at each spot, making a total of 21 points possible. For the duration of the competition, the contestants were given three tosses with each 10 feet toss counting for one point. The longest throw was one over 75 feet.

The winners of the regional competition will advance to the national championship held at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., on April 29 and 30.

Clackamas will sponsor a picnic barbeque during the April 23 competition. Cost of barbeque is \$1.50 per person. It will continue until 3 p.m.

Cougars second to Lane

Clackamas Cougar men's track team lost a revenge match to Lane Community College on Saturday in a three-team meet which also included Linn-Benton CC.

Lane, won the meet with 96 points to Clackamas' 57 after suffering a defeat to the Cougars last Saturday, April 2, at the Oregon Community College Athletics Association relays. Linn-Benton scored 37 points.

The Cougars showed power in the distance races as Kelly Sullivan beat the national qualifying mark of 14:33 in the three-mile race. Sullivan ran a 14:30.5.

Alan Knoop won the six-mile with a 30:58.6 time, lapping other contestants in the race.

Don Brown took second place in the mile race with a 4:25, and Ron Shaumburg won the 440 yd. dash with his 51 second pace, which according to Coach Buck Monroe, was a "Good job."

Lane dominated the sprints with their number one man Andrew Banks, from Los

Angeles. Banks won the 100 and 220 yd. dashes along with the long jump, and the 440 yd. relay.

Although weak in the speed area, the Cougars managed other fine performances from Lynn Teuscher, who won the 120 yd. high hurdles in 15.3, and Frank Gibson, winner of the high jump with a 6-2 leap.

Jeff Harmon placed the Cougars in second place in the javelin toss with his 192 heave. Harmon also took third in the shot put.

Southern Idaho College, Clark College, Blue Mountain CC, and Chemeketa Community College will battle Clackamas men's team this Saturday, April 16, at 1 p.m. on the Cougar track.

Clackamas may have their work really cut out for them against the powerful Idaho squad reported Clackamas coach Buck Monroe. "Southern Idaho is very strong; they have several outstanding distancemen and sprinters. They will be the tough ones to beat."

Trackies run at Willamette

On Saturday, the Clackamas Community College women's track team traveled to Willamette University to compete in the Southern Area Invitational.

The Cougars ended up with a fifth place finish, winding up only one point behind both Willamette and Spokane Falls colleges.

In the running events, only the mile and 440 relay teams bettered their times. The mile relay squad of Tammy Likens, Debbie Leathers, Amanda Eggleston, and Verna Simon cut two seconds off their old record of 4:24. The 440 relay team of Cindy Peterson, Barbara Johnson, Likens and Eggleston shaved one tenth of a second from

their old mark to set the new one at 51.74.

Tami Wulf tossed the javelin 129.3 feet, just seven inches short of qualifying her for Regionals.

Clackamas coach Roger Smith hopes to qualify several performers for the regional and national meets in the next few meets. Eggleston, Simon, Karen Iiams, Wulf and Leathers are all close to the qualifying standards.

Clackamas Community College's women's track team will travel to Lane and Mt. Hood Community colleges for two meets this week as the Cougars hope to continue their fine performances.

Golfers lose second

Clackamas finished fifth out of six teams in a league contest held last Friday, April 8 in Santiam.
