ASG meeting

Today the Associated Student Government will decide whether or not to allocate an additional \$1,900 to the ASG-sponsored CCC "Open House Fair".

The fair, which has already received \$500 from ASG, will be open to the community for them to see what goes on at the college.

Crime report

Gardens available

Garden plots are still available in Clackamas Community College's Green Fingers program, which provides garden space for area residents.

The three-acre space near the Smuckers complex on the CCC campus is divided into 180 plots which cover 702 square feet each.

The plots are used by residents from throughout the college's district including Milwaukie, Gladstone, West Linn, Oregon City, Molalla, and Estacada.

Preparations are being made now to ready the space for May first planting.

The cost of registration for the program is \$2. Seeds and fertilizer will be supplied on a limited basis, and carts and a rototiller are available.

Financial aid halted

Eighty-six students at Clackamas Community College were determined to be ineligible for continuation of financial assistance this spring term, according to Ron Hoodye, financial aid specialist.

In most cases the termination of their financial aid was due to a lack of academic progress. These students who lost eligibility may be reinstated by bringing themselves within the minimum hours required for satisfactory progress.

Engineering program

A new dual degree in engineering has been implemented by the Pacific University College of Arts and Sciences.

The new program is designed for students who are interested in careers in engineering or in industrial applications of physics, chemistry and mathematics.

It is a five-year program involving three years at Pacific and the final two years at one of the cooperating engineering colleges.

At the end of this five-year period, the student receives a baccalaureate degree in applied science from Pacific and a bachelor of science degree from the engineering school.


Pacific has cooperating agreements with Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta and with Washington University in St. Louis.

A complete range of engineering specialties is available through these schools including civil, chemical, electrical, mechanical and nuclear engineering as well as computer science.

Admission to the programs will be essentially automatic for those students with a "B" average at Pacific who are recommended by the Pacific Applied Science and Mathematics Advisory Group.

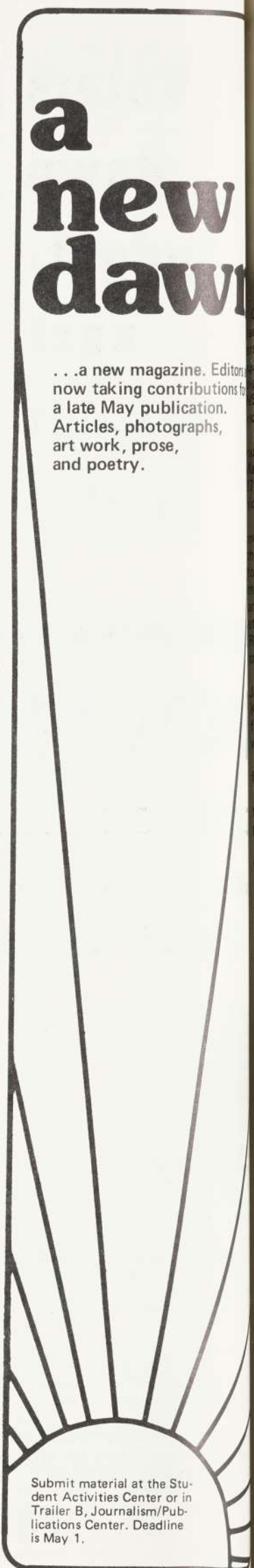
