Don Thompson, Frank Jordan, Blaine Weninger, and Daryn Kuehl are the four Coach McMahon will be taking to the tournament. A full team really consists of five people, but the fifth bowler transferred to a university at the beginning of Winter

term. The team has been looking for someone to fill his spot. According to Coach McMahon, they are also looking for extra people to join the team, so if someone cannot play for some reason there is another player to fill his spot.

To qualify for the bowling team a person must be enrolled in five credit hours a term and maintain a 2.0 GPA. This includes men or women. Right now there is not a women's team because there is only one member and to have a team there must be four.

"Members of the bowling team have quite a bit of fun along with the competition," stated Coach McMahon. "There is a chance to travel, meet people and even compete in tournaments to win scholarships." The Women Cougars posted a pair of convincing victories last week and repositioned themselves at the top of the league. Clackamas traveled to Eugene Saturday and face Lane Community College in a battle for first place. The Cougars came out storming and demolished Lane 92-68.

"We were in a game we had to win and the girls really rose to the occasion," Coach Phil Garver commented.

Angela Hewlett and Alicia Stephenson both scored 20 points to pace the Cougars. Pam Pember turned in another strong effort

with 18 points and 13 rebounds. Hewlett and Kelli Brown combined for 15 assists from the backcourt.

Jean-Marie Lilliard came out from the bench on fire and contributed 12 points and seven rebounds. The win boosted the Cougars' record to 12-1 overall and 9-1 in league play.

On Wednesday, Jan. 31, the Cougars returned home to Randall Gym still smarting from their first loss at Linn-Benton. The team was on a mission to prove the loss a fluke, and the PCC Panthers had the misfortune to be the opponent. The Cougs hit them early,

hard, and often in running away to a 95-52 win. Angela Hewlett knifed through the Panther defense for a season-high 39 points. Stephenson dominated the middle and pulled down 13 rebounds. Brown dished out 11 assists and played and excellent floor game.

"It's PCC's first year in the league with a women's program," Coach Garver said. "They only had six players, but the put up a gutsy effort."

Clackamas decided the issue early, and the players off the bench were the recipients of some good minutes. The Cougars face Mt. Hood Wednesday at 6 p.m. in their own Randall Gym.
