# Public safety, criminal justice to merge in administration reorganization plan

The final proposal regarding the consolidation of Campus Security with the Criminal Justice program was decided on in yesterdays President's Council meeting.

"I think it's a real positive move forward," said Jim Brouillette public service/safety department chairperson.

Under the proposal Brouillette would be moved to a director position. Another Criminal Justice instructor would be hired to replace Brouillette, even though Brouillette says he would still teach some of the Criminal Justice classes.

A classified non-faculty staff member would be hired, for a sixmonth trial period, to fill the position soon to be vacated by the retirement of Stan Johnson, chief of Public Safety.

The hiring of a classified per-

son for six months will give Brouillette the opportunity to take a good look at the Campus Security organization without having to make any abrupt changes. Yet change is what Brouillette has in mind

He sees the responsibilities of campus security as an excellent training opportunity for Criminal Justice students.

Security of the campus, safety of students, especially at night walking to their cars, and the safeguarding of property against vandalism are some of the responsibilities Brouillette discussed.

"You have all that, at the same time you have the opportunity to teach students how to do that," said Brouillette.

According to Brouillette the Criminal Justice program has the most declared majors at CCC.

"In our introduction to law enforcement class last fall we had 120 students enrolled."

The program has carned the respect of many area law enforcement agencies as a no nonsense program. "So you start getting reputations like that," commented Brouillette, "and pretty soon people start coming here because they know if they get an associate degree in criminal justice it's a valid degree, a degree of some substance."

At this time Brouillette is the only full time Criminal Justice instructor and the rest are part time.

"In a way it's good because I can take the practitioners in the field, the people who are out there right now, the best," stated Brouillette. "I can bring them in here as part-time instructors and we can use them for all their knowledge and all their expertise for what's happening right now. That's what we can offer to the students."

Mark Pettibone, a representative from Multiple Sclerosis, will be on hand to discuss the psychological effects of the disabled.

A group from SOAR (Shared Outdoor And Recreation) will be on hand, as will a group from the Blind Commission.

view is a voice synthesized computer, which operates by the commands of the voice.

"We're really excited about this. The feed back that we've been getting from posters, and others things have really been terrific," said Vi Christensen, specialist for disabled students. The activities are open to all students, as well as non-students. Christensen urges you to come out Friday and take a look.

"A lot of this stuff is really interesting, and it's really informing. I would definitely encourage people to come see it."
