People sought to canvass against Ballot Measure 5

People are being sought to canvass against Ballot Measure 5 this weekend and next.

The group of canvassers will be meeting at Papandreas Pizza Parlor in Oregon City at 10 a.m. on Saturday Oct. 27 and Nov. 3. After the canvassing is over a free pizza lunch will be provided for volunteers.

Ballot Measure 5 reads "Shall constitution set limits on property taxes, and dedicate them to public schools and non-school government operations?"

More specifically, Measure 5 will limit property tax funding for schools to \$15 per \$1000 and non-school funding to \$10 for every 1000. Measure 5 will also gradually decrease school funding to \$5 per \$1000 in 1995-1996 according

to the Nov. 6, 1990 Voters' Pamphlet.

It also says that the state general fund will be required to replace any revenue lost by public schools so long as this does not grow by more than six percent per year.

"It's not the answer. It's going to limit school funding," said State Representative Bruce Hugo, who spoke on campus Monday about the measure.

All state funded services and schools could be dramatically affected by the passage of Measure 5.

Although the property taxes of the general public will be reduced, property taxes will be assessed according to the land's market value. According to Hugo, "small farmers and small timber owners will be hit incredibly hard."

Discussions continue Randall possible new location for Recreation Center

The fate of the Recreation Center is yet to be decided.

Although the decision is not final, a possible solution was reached in meetings yesterday. Instead of moving the Recreation Center to the trailer it was proposed that it be moved to Randall room 101, according to Acting Dean of Student Services Dian Connett.

The President's Council, the Instructional Council and Student Services Council discussed the issues surrounding the proposal to move the Recreation Center to Trailer A. Part of the issue involved is that the move to the trailer would be temporary as would the move of other departments such as the Financial Aid Center, Career and Job Development Center, and Counseling.

"We're considering the issues surrounding the game room move and all of the moves, and have decided we want to avoid

interim moves, and get the areas that are going to move to their final locations," Connett said.

The initial plan for moving the Recreation Center to Trailer A was that the move would take place sometime during December, most likely over Christmas break. If the Randall location is finalized the move will be scheduled for sometime in the Spring.

"The use of Randall 101 and or part of the lobby will take care of the interim move as well as the long term move," Connett said. "The time frame will also be moved if this space is chosen.

"With the Spring time frame, if it happens, that will give us more time to discuss the problems surrounding the move," Connett said.

After the proposal to move the Recreation Center was approved by the Board three weeks ago, Connett looked into the issues in depth and formed a list of people's concerns.

"If this idea is approved we will take this time to address the

concerns with the game room move to the trailer and apply them to the Randall location," Connett said.

According to Connett, some of the concerns with the trailer location were access, distance from the center of campus, and security. With the Randall location these problems will be easier to solve.

"We are trying to move toward a decision, but this is a new option to discuss," Connett said. "We are hoping that people might feel better about this new option.

"This whole issue is connected with the space problem," Connett said. "We saw this as a better solution to the long term plan.

"This plan is just in the discussion stages, but I don't see any major problems with it," Connett said. "I don't know if the Fire Marshall or the architect will have problems with this location."

Speech team takes third in tournament

"It's a lot of fun," said Thatcher. "It may seem like it's boring but it really isn't."

"Sometimes, it can be really funny," adds Nash. "It's like watching T.V. live, seeing your favorite comedy show live."

Frank Harlow, the group's instructor, felt that the group did well.

"They got their feet wet," Harlow said. "We had some good performances," he added. "Now that they know what to do we'll see if they can do it."

The team members include sophomores Todd Alexander and Bill Anderson, and new members Jared Thatcher, David Nash, Ivy Wall, Tammy Recknor and Richard Grooms.

The next tournament will be held at The University of Oregon on Oct. 26-28. "We expect an exciting season," said Harlow.

12 at Lower Columbia College; Jan. 25-27 at Pacific Lutheran College; Feb. 1-3 at Willamette University; Feb. 28 through March 2 at Whitworth/Spokane Falls Community College; April 7-13 at Orange Coast; April 26-27 at Lane Community College; and May 10-11 at Clackamas Community College.
