Membership increases for BSM

Baptist Student Ministries (BSM), a nation wide organization on college campuses, has been growing at Clackamas for four years.

Under the guidance of Director Ken Harmon and a leadership team, "BSM has grown from a core group of 10 students to an enthusiastic core group of 38," said Harmon.

"Since this year began at least 100 students have been involved in the club's activities," Harmon explained.

According to Harmon, the group is having some "growing pains" due to the number of students involved.

"We got caught off guard with not having a plan ready to handle the numbers of students who became involved," he said.

BSM is growing into a new

stage of transition, said Harmon.

"(We're becoming) smaller support type care groups which will be led by student leaders," said Harmon. He stressed that the group is student led, even though he is the director. The students are the ones making the decisions in the types of activities.

The nationally organized campus activity is set up on three foundations, according to Harmon.

"It is Christ-centered, Church-based, and student led," he said.

"(The focus if the group is) sharing the gospel on campus and the personal relationships that students can have with Christ through discipleship and spiritual growth," Harmon stated.

"When students leave Clackamas, the church will follow them through life. BSM can't. BSM is the arm of the local churches. We encourage student involvement in their local church of their choice,"

said Harmon.

Five students from the group went to Moscow, Idaho in October for the Northwest Student Conference. Approximately 20 students went from the whole Portland area. The group also performed on a Saint House at Beaver Creek Baptist Church in which 10 students were actively involved and over 90 people attended.

The group holds weekly Christian Action Group Bible Studies on Wednesdays from noon to 1 p.m. in Randall 12 and on Thursdays from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. in Randall 220. The club also has a weekly rally with special speakers on Tuesday evenings from 8:30 to 10 in the community center.

"The group is growing," said BSM President Todd Alexander. "I got really excited when I found out the amount of student interest in BSM."
