"I like having Dennis as a director," said Burnett. "Let's just say he knows fish."

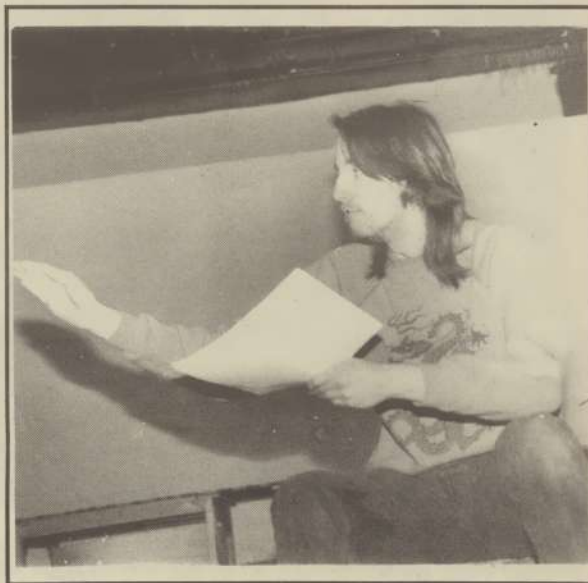

East coast instructor here on exchange program for a year

Ken Hennig joined the CCC staff fall term as an exchange English instructor from Nigra community College in New York.

Hennig teaches the English Composition Series 121, 122, 123 as well as drama, fiction and poetry.

"Courses are quite a bit different than what I taught at Niagara Community," said Hennig.

At NCC Hennig taught composition courses for 25 years. He received his Bachelors and Masters degree at Buffalo State University and Doctorate at the University of Buffalo.

He said the main difference was the classes were not so book oriented. He said that English departments are very different experience for teaching.

"I'm enjoying the classes, but I am not as well prepared as I am used to being; it's hard work."

"The English Department here is wonderful; I feel so comfortable. They are friendly, helpful, and share materials," said Hennig.

"I find these students to be more conscientious than in New York, with a stronger sense of individuality," said Hennig.

Hennig has lived in New York all his life, and explained his reason for applying for the exchange position was his children are raised, and he needed a change. He strongly considered an overseas exchange, but finally decided on a western U.S. exchange because his children live in California. Besides, he "always wanted to come spend some time on the west coast."

He chose six community colleges around San Francisco Bay, Arizona, and Oregon areas, and was accepted by Clackamas.



The Community College Exchange System operates in two different ways. The person to person agreement is where one instructor goes to a college and another instructor from another community college fills in his place. Hennig is on the financial exchange in which Clackamas pays NCC for his replacement for the year.

"We are sure glad we were

able to work out the exchange," said Tom Richards, English Department Chairman. "It has been a positive experience for both parties."

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
