technical fields.

Scholarships will not be affected and tuition waivers will not be effectively altered. Thirteen percent of the tuition waivers will be eliminated but these were waivers not currently being used.

According to Dian Connett, dean of students, "There will be an increase in need based tuition waivers and no change in talent waivers." Talent waivers include

those given for music, athletics, art, and other programs.

"The decisions made by the committee are ones that will keep CCC competitive. We are trying to keep CCC as strong as possible. The classes we eliminated were because of low enrollment or because of low demand in the job market. In the future we can add some classes that will be more useful in a more high tech industry," Keyser concluded.
