The Student Art Show, which is currently being displayed at the Pauling Gallery, contains a wide range of art pieces composed of an assortment of mediums.

"We try to show a variety of works from the whole year," said Leland John, a drawing and painting instructor here at Clackamas.

The forms of art in the exhibit vary. There are oil paintings, watercolors, pottery, calligraphy, and other mediums represented. These are all being displayed throughout the Pauling Gallery and in the Art Center itself.

"In order to have some kind of fairness we basically assign walls [to the different art classes]. It is a cooperative effort," said John.

One art student, Bernice

Evans, said that her design teacher had simply pulled out some of her work to be put on display. "I felt pretty good about it. I felt great," she said.

Another student, Vidya Hivale, who has an oil painting in the exhibit, was more used to having her work displayed. "I have had paintings up ever since I was a kid. So I am fairly accustomed to it," said Hivale. She feels, though, that it is very important for some people to have their art up in the exhibit.

"It's such a satisfying feeling. It's almost like an addiction," according to Hivale.

Lydia Luethi, an 83 year old art student, agrees with Hivale. Luethi has three paintings in the art show, and is very proud of her work. Among these is a painting of a dog.

"It's the only animal over

there," she said. "I love the pictures."

Luethi has been painting for ten years now, and said that she enjoys it very much.

"Painting fills your life with joy, and gives you a feeling of fulfillment," she related.

She attributes much of her success to the instructors here at Clackamas. She said that at other places the instructors tell their students to "put a little blue here and a little brown there." Luethi does not like that kind of teaching because, "The painting is not yours then."

When talking about John, her painting teacher, she said, "Leland is an excellent teacher; he finds just the right thing to say, at just the right time, to just the right person."

The meaning of relationships and the things that bind people will be explored in three student directed one act plays on May 30 at 7:30 p.m. in the McLoughlin Theatre. Admission is free.

"Sing to me through open windows," Author Kopit's story of a man, a boy and a clown learning to grow up and leave childhood behind, is being directed by Lichen June.

"The atmosphere of the show will really evoke memories," said June. "Everyone will see something different about it. They will find their own meaning."

Troy Kerr plays Andrew, the boy. Ottoman, the man, is portrayed by Adam Jarvey. David Burnett plays the clown.

"The boy is like the captive audience," said Kerr. "He stands in awe of the powerful magician."

Jarvey explains his character is a ghost of what he once was.

"The man used to be great, but now he has fallen and is living in his memories and terrified of the future," explained Jarvey.

A.R. Gurney, Jr.'s story "The Golden Fleece" is being directed by Ivy Waller and is based on the mythological tale of Jason and Medea.

Betty and Bill, the characters of the play, sit on two chairs on the plain stage. They compare their marriage to the marriage of Jason

and Medea.

"I think this play gives hope to marriage," said Waller, who portrays Betty. "It points out the things that happen in a relationship and says you don't have to be like that."

Shane Reeves, who plays Bill, explains his character leaves much to be desired.

"Bill is all the negative aspects of the male ego amplified. Most men have some flaws; this man has all of them," said Reeves. He still believes there is a practical side to the play.

"This might help people take a realistic approach to relationships," Reeves said.

Ludlow Fair, written by Landford Wilson, is directed by Adam Jarvey. It takes place during the course of one evening at the apartment of two roommates, Rachel and Agnes. It is based on the interactions of the two women.

Rachel is played by Alexandra Ferguson. Kathy Clapp plays Agnes.

"It's about their perceptions... how they see their lives," said Jarvey.

"One thing that I like about this play is that it portrays women very realistically. You can see how two very different people interrelate in your life or elsewhere," said Jarvey.
