The "Blubinos," who have headlined Portland's "Mayor's Ball" for the past three years, have just returned from a European tour where they performed with such renowned artists as Johnny Winter and John Lee Hooker.

The popular group of musicians, the "Blubinos," consist of Monti Amundson, who plays guitar and sings lead vocals; Debby Smith, who plays bass guitar and does some of the vocals; and Corey Burdon, who plays the drums and also does some vocals.

"We are not political. We just like to plug the guitars into the amps and kick some butt," replied Monti Amundson when asked how the band felt about certain issues.

When asked how he and his staff were able to schedule such a high quality band to play at CCC,

Entertainment Coordinator Eddie Murphy replied, "The Blubinos" felt it necessary to return to their roots of rock and roll because success is rapidly overtaking them. This free concert represents the authenticity of the working class connection that the 'Blubinos' seem to embody. There music seems to cross all cultural, age and class barriers. Everyone enjoys thier music."

The fact that ASG was able to schedule a concert that could be held within the CC mall is in itself an accomplishment due to the fact that a lot of business takes place within the mall on a perpetual basis.

When asked how the ASG was able to get permission to use the CC mall for this event, ASG advisor Jim Jackson said "The fact that the 'Blubinos' are such a popular group caused several ASG officers to unite in order to regain control of the CC mall." As for future concerts in the CC mall, Jim Jackson

said, "There is definitely a future for activities in the CC mall as long as ASG continues to temper the events so that other businesses, like the information booth, can continue to function while the specific event is taking place."

"I did some networking with a lot of administrative people over a draft concerning the use of the CC mall for ASG events," replied ASG President Lauri Mayfield, "I was told that we could use it if we didn't interrupt the functioning of the information booth."

ASG Vice President Renae Parr also helped campaign for use of the CC mall for the "Blubino" concert. "We have a major group and we want to provide for a big crowd of students. The departments in the CC mall all cooperated with ASG in the greatest way possible and I personally thank them for that." "I also think that it would be nice if, after the show, the students took the time to thank the departments for use of the mall."

New degree available

Clackamas Community College students will now be able to study a new Technical Communications curriculum beginning Fall Term of 1992. This two-year curriculum will satisfy the Oregon transfer program of course work now available to community college students in the state.

In addition to the required courses for the Oregon transfer program, the required components of the curriculum will be the Technical Report Writing course, WR 227; four courses in Computer Science--CS 120, CS 121, BA 101 and BA 131; a desktop publishing course; a business course; and a journalism basic reporting course,

J 216. The regular general education requirements will be part of the curriculum, as are all block transfer curricula.

Suggested electives for this curriculum will be an intermediate grammar course (not remedial), a second-year level foreign language, principles of accounting, a journalism editing class, and additional speech courses.
