I have chaired several committees and chaired a blood drive every term this year. The Valentine's Day activities, free pizza, balloon sale and flower sale were all under my chair.

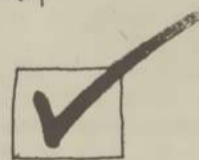
I just want what is best for the students," concluded Barnett.
