Donations build programs

Foundation raises funds for college

Established in the early 1970s, The College Foundation served as a vehicle for people to make tax deductible donations of equipment and money.

In 1986, the state-based organization became more aggressive and moved to a community level to "raise friends and funds in the community," according to John Keyser, college president.

The foundation consists of 25 board members who are active community and business leaders. "They (board members) want to see our students be successful," Keyser said.

The foundation board members create fund-raising activities in the community. Proceeds of these fund-raisers go to sponsor various projects to enrich the campus, as well as scholarships and emergency grants for students.

Currently, the foundation has two main projects in the works: the Family Resource Center and the Oregon Advanced Technology Center in Wilsonville. Foundation board members are raising money to finish these projects. They are also responsible for paying for the construction of the fountain located between Dye

Learning Center, Streeter Hall and the Gregory Forum.

Other programs the foundation sponsors are yearly scholarships awarded to students through the financial aid office. A mini-grants program is available to "faculty and staff members who are doing special things to benefit students," Keyser said.

Another grant program is an option for students in a one-time financial crisis. The College Foundation provides monetary grants for students with financial burdens. Keyser feels those dollars "are used very effectively."

The foundation sponsors several annual events such as the scholarship Awards Banquet and a \$10,000 fund-raising golf tournament. The funds raised from this event are used as scholarship money.

The Corporate Challenge Golf Tournament, set for Sept. 1993, is an additional money-maker hoped to raise at least \$25,000 towards the finish of the Family Resource Center.

Keyser and David Dickson, assistant to the president, both feel fortunate to have such an organization working for the good of the college.

"To have 25 business leaders as part of our network who

give good information about how the college is doing and better ideas about how to do things differently is invaluable. They are a very high energy, creative, committed group of individuals," Keyser said.

Dickson agreed stating, "I'm extremely happy about the quality of people who chose to get involved with the foundation. I think we're very lucky. The group is really moving in the right direction in terms of what we've accomplished."

"There are very high quality people who really believe in this great school...Community colleges meet important needs in society. They help a lot of students who are really making something of their lives, students who I consider unsung heroes of our country...People like our students will make or break this country within the next 20 years," Dickson said.

Not only business or community leaders can be involved in the foundation. Anyone can donate a one-time sum, or can make a pledge over a certain time span. If anyone would like to make a donation or become a foundation volunteer, contact the Foundation Office for details.

not old enough to vote on the issue, the debate was heated on both sides. The opinions expressed by students were as strongly felt or as sharply divided as the voters who decided the outcome of Measure 9 yesterday.

Among those supporting Measure 9 at the forum, the greatest fear seemed to be that the educational and counseling programs begun in other states concerning the promotion of homosexuality might find their way into Oregon.

In a heated exchange, opponents claimed that these programs have not begun in Oregon and that the whole issue had been blown out of proportion. Proponents believed, however, that the introduction of homosexual programs in the schools is only a matter of time.

The forum was organized by junior Julia Mayer as a community service project. She got the idea through a state leadership program that she had just completed during the summer.
