Momentum came away with a win against ACE yesterday. This means that ACE and Daphne's Team will compete Thursday to see who advances in the losers' bracket.

The Fantastic Four will also play tomorrow at 12:30 p.m. They will take on The Hoopsters.

The championship game will be held on May 20 also at 12:30 p.m. The winners will receive Clackamas intramural T-shirts.

Four more Lady Cougars qualify for Northwest track championships

Both Cougar track squads performed well in last weekend's non-scoring Western Oregon Open Track and Field Meet, but it was the women's team that saw four more members qualify for the Northwest championships.

Two came in the same event, but it was Elizabeth Ribbeck, who had already qualified in the 10,000 meters, who stole the show. She earned a personal record with a time of 41 minutes, 25.2 seconds, beating her previous best by a whopping 43 seconds. Her effort moved her to number six on the all-time list at Clackamas.

Dianna Polack and Allison Morris qualified for the championships in the event with personal records, as well. Polack clocked in at 42:07.7. That run is the eighth-best in Clackamas track history.

Morris finished with an uncanny time of 43:43.43. Head Coach Mike Hodges had special

praise for her performance. "The courage she showed was incredible," he said. "By the end of the race, the front of both of her shoes were drenched in blood." Morris' blisters got worse as the race wore on, yet she still finished and qualified.

Lynda Cornwall finished with a time of 5:05.66 to qualify in the 1,500. Leah Guilford barely beat her with a time of 5:05.60 to earn a personal best. Jenny Campbell also ran the event in a personal-record time of 5:08.54. The three Cougars finished one-two-three in the event.

Kristi Preiskorn was the fourth qualifier in Saturday's meet. She finished the 400 hurdle course in 1:08.84, ninth on the all-time list.

Other notables, according to Hodges, were Jill Warrington and Misti Makin. Warrington came in second in the shot put, third in the javelin and fifth in the discus.

Makin competed strongly in the 100 hurdles and "has been

very consistent in the last month," Hodges said.

On the men's side, Brian Buckingham cut 21 seconds off his personal best in the 3,000 steeplechase, putting him at number one in the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges.

Mike Brown earned a season's best in the long jump, with a leap of 22 feet, 6 and 1/2 inches.

Jason Mottaz ran a personal best in the 5,000 with a time of 15:35.35.

And the Cougar pole vaulters Chris Hale and Mike Brady each successfully made it over the 15-foot, 7-inch mark.

Saturday, the Cougars host the Clackamas Invitational. A dozen colleges and several open club teams will be competing. Hodges said this is the final tuneup before the Southern championships.

"We're exactly where we want to be two weeks before our first championship meet," Hodges explained.

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
