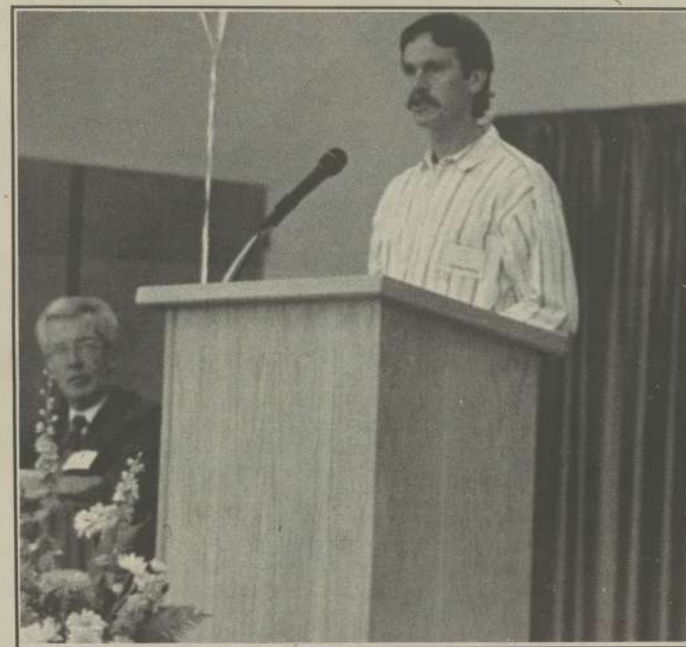

Clackamas sponsors timber debate

The Clackamas Social Science Department will be sponsoring the Ancient Forests and Timber Harvests debate today at noon in the Gregory Forum.

The future of Oregon's natural resources versus timber industry employment will be the topic of the dialogue.

Rick Brown, resource specialist for the National Wildlife Federation, will go toe-to-toe with

Ralph Saperstein, vice president for operations with the Northwest Forestry Association.

Joe Uris, sociology instructor, radio talk show host and newly-elected president of the Clackamas Faculty Senate, will moderate the debate.

"It will be hot and nasty and down and dirty," Uris said. "Ralph Saperstein is a powerful advocate for the forest product industry. Rick Brown gave the most eloquent presentation at the Forest

Summit for President Clinton."

Both candidates are considered experts in their respective fields, and are expected to be worthy adversaries.

"It should be very interesting because several students here (CCC) have families that are dependant on the forest product industry. At the same time, a lot of people in this community are concerned about the survival of the ancient forests," Uris concluded.
