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CCC Board of Education to fill two positions

Area residents will cast their votes for two positions on the CCC Board of Education in a special mail-in election to be held March 22.

The candidates, Estle Harlan of Milwaukie and Mimi Chitty of West Linn, are both long-time members of the board and are running unopposed for re-election for the 1994-1998 term.

Harlan, who represents zone 1, has served on the Board of Education since 1985 and held positions of board chair and vice-chair from 1988 to 1990.

Harlan has been a solid waste management consultant since 1983. In addition to her contributions to the CCC Board of Education, she has done work with the Oregon Progress Board and

with special committees of the Department of Environmental Quality, Metro, the City of Portland, Clackamas County, the City

of Milwaukie and the North Clackamas School District.

Harlan is married to former state representative and Clackamas County Commissioner Dale M. Harlan.

On Clackamas' future, Harlan said, "I feel that the college has made great progress in the quality of course offerings and in serving the needs of the student body. I am also gratified by the level of commitment and concern on the part of the community as a whole.

"Our biggest challenge for the future will be in the area of cost controls and funding," Harlan continued. "The principal question we must address is, how do we continue to provide the best possible education while assuring both accessibility and affordability."

Chitty, who represents the communities of Wilsonville and West Linn, has been a member of the CCC Board of Education since 1988 and a member of the CCC Foundation Board of Directors since 1989. She also

serves as the Board of Education's liaison to the CCC Foundation.

Her record of community service includes six years as a

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member of the West Linn Library Board and two full terms on the West Linn School Board. She has been a volunteer driver for Meals on Wheels for 15 years and is an

active member of the League of Women Voters. She currently serves on the Clackamas County Compensation Review Board, which evaluates and makes recommendations regarding the salaries of elected county officials.

Chitty's family includes her husband Jack, six children and six grandchildren.

The future of the college and the challenge for the board members is of major concern, Chitty said.

"In the wake of the effects of Measure Five, I am deeply concerned with the problems of impending cuts and the need to implement effective cost controls.

"The future of quality education depends on our ability, as a community, to structure a reliable tax base and a stable funding source," Chitty concluded.

'Maximum Sex' stresses healthy relationships with spiritual base

The Campus Crusade for Christ International and the Baptist Student Ministries co-sponsored "Maximum Sex," a video on relationships, sex and you, last week at the Gregory Forum.

According to BSM Advisor Carolyn Arneemann, 36 people showed for Friday's program and an even smaller group of 17 gathered at Thursday's session.

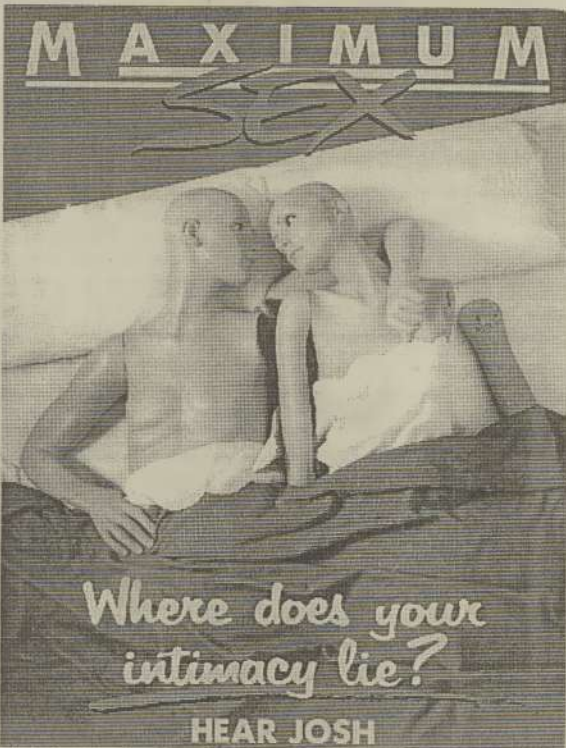
"It presents what it presents with no hidden agenda. It presents the facts and brings some gospel at the end. That was our goal," Arneemann said.

The video featured speaker Josh McDowell, a nationally recognized speaker on sex and the influence of religion in relationships and life.

McDowell began his sermon, which he was actually giving to a large group of college students on the video, but to a much smaller Clackamas gathering, stressing the three dimensions of a sexually-fulfilled relationship. McDowell admitted that the physical part of a relationship is a very important element, but only that, an element.

"Most people today only rely on the physical," McDowell said. "They don't realize there are three parts to it. They (the younger generation) think a good relationship is how many (sexual) positions they know. They don't have sex, they get their backs thrown out."

McDowell was effective



in lightening the atmosphere before dropping his serious points by using humor to keep his younger audience in tune.

"Let's face it. Most guys just want to hit the sheets. We need to put the physical in perspective. Sex won't hold your relationship together. Sex won't get you past the honeymoon," McDowell rationalized.

McDowell, moving on to the second dimension of a sexually-fulfilled relationship, the psy-

chological, pointed out that your most important sex organ isn't the one behind the zipper of your jeans, but the one that sits on your shoulders.

"Your mind is your most important sex organ. Don't be afraid to use it," he said.

The third part of a healthy relationship, McDowell stressed, was the need for a spiritual base.

"The 10 Commandments were provided to protect and provide," he said.

McDowell emphasized the need for structure and rules in a relationship, just as in raising his children. "I tell my kids not to touch the stove because I care about them and don't want to see them get burned, not because I'm trying to be mean or unreasonable. It's the same in a relationship. People don't tell you to wear condoms or to wait to have sex because they are trying to be mean," he explained, "they're just trying to help."

After giving his listeners the foundation in which to build their relationship, McDowell gave them three reasons to hold on to the total construction of the framework.

"There are a lot of reasons to wait to have sex," McDowell said. "Love and trust are needed for a good relationship. Love and trust take time."

Other reasons to wait are the numerous sexually-transmitted diseases that a person may obtain. "There are 38 STDs out there. You can get up to five at a time. The number one STD is genital warts. How many of you know that? It's the number one cause of cervix cancer," McDowell said.

McDowell also pointed out that AIDS, the newest and most deadly of the STDs, is classified as a lenti virus.

"They've never found a cure for a lenti virus," McDowell said. "What makes anyone think that they will find one for AIDS?"

The fact is AIDS kills. As of today there is no vaccine currently available to prevent

AIDS. In the U.S., 30 people a day are lost to this deadly virus, some of whom were infected up to 10 years ago.

McDowell did point out that the fastest growing number of infected individuals is among the 20 to 29 age group.

"Why don't they have statistics on the failure rate of people contracting AIDS even with the use of condoms? In an independent study, doctors found that in couples using condoms 100 percent of the time, there was a 30 percent failure rate," McDowell noted.

McDowell admitted he hated having to even talk about AIDS, because it is "such a sad thing". He recalled when herpes and gonorrhea were the most distressful part of his STD lecture.

"You can get AIDS 31 days a month, including February!" he proclaimed.

McDowell, bringing his own personal code of ethics into his lecture said he hoped that they would be used in the audiences' bedrooms.

"You need to think with your mind and not your loins. Morals are when you feel good after you do it," McDowell told his audience.

"We all have the power to make the morally-correct decisions. If you stop (making those decisions) you're no better than a dog that's in heat," McDowell concluded.
