Nursing Instructor Patricia Krumm has been named Oregon's 1994 Search for Excellence Honoree by the American Nurses Association.

She is a nurse practitioner with the Clackamas County Health Department and the president of a fundraising arm of the Oregon Nurses Association. She was also recently reappointed to the Oregon State Board of Nursing by Governor Barbara Roberts, a three-year term.

Krumm started working for CCC in 1973. "I was at the right

place at the right time," Krumm said about the job opening.

Krumm's interest in nursing began as a child. "I always wanted to be a nurse as a kid," she said. This was probably partly due to the fact that her grandmother, aunts, mother, and now her own daughter were nurses. "Nursing seems to run in certain families," she said.

She graduated from high school in 1960, and said that "nursing and teaching were the primary professions that women went into...and that would probably account for the fact that so many family members are nurses or teachers."

Krumm has managed to do

both nursing and teaching. "I always liked teaching other nurses," she said.

Krumm received her bachelor's in nursing from OHSU. After joining CCC, she received her Master's through OHSU part-time, and her Advanced Certificate in Nursing.

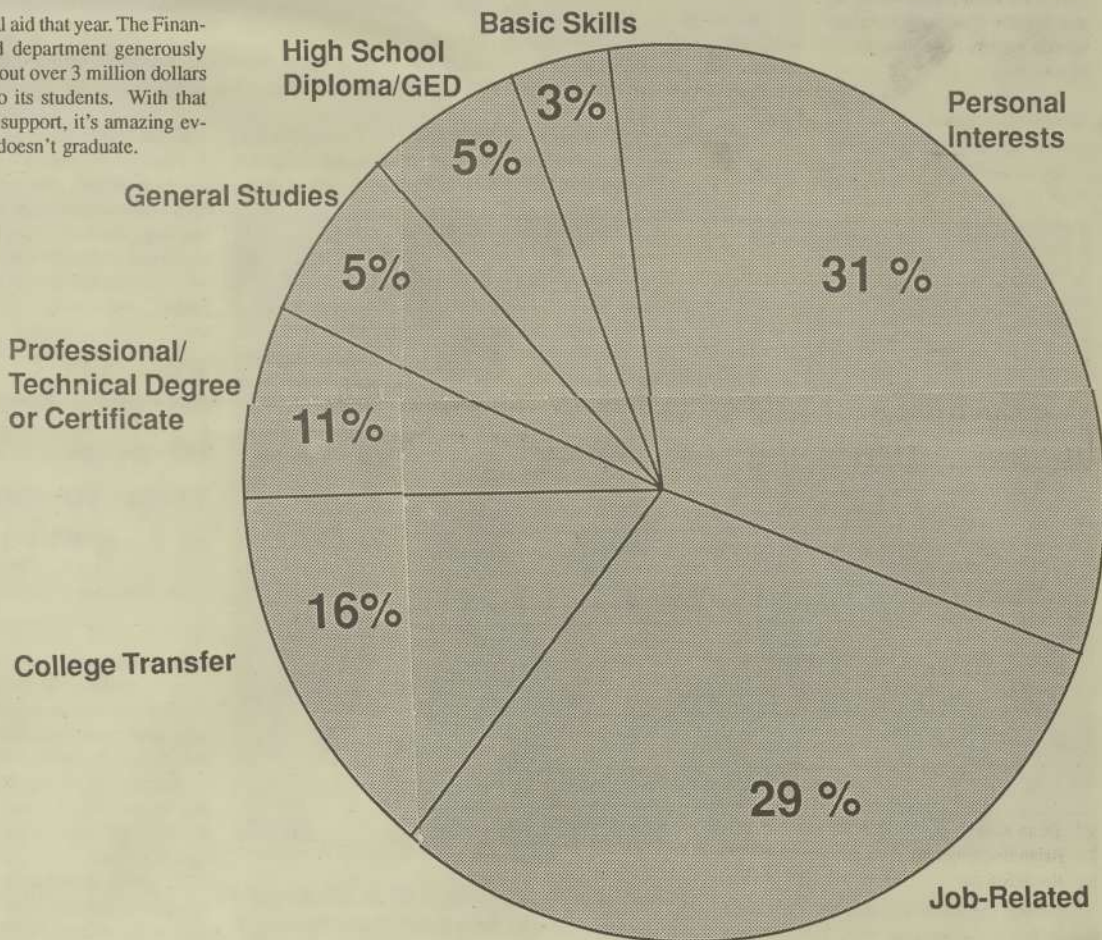
There is much in the way of student diversity here at our college. Just look around you and you'll see students and faculty from all walks of life; a few with homes on the other side of the globe.

During the 1992-93 school year, Clackamas began its surge in enrollment. That year 27,178 students flooded CCC classrooms. Over 4,800 of those students were attending classes full-time. 1,542 students received some form of

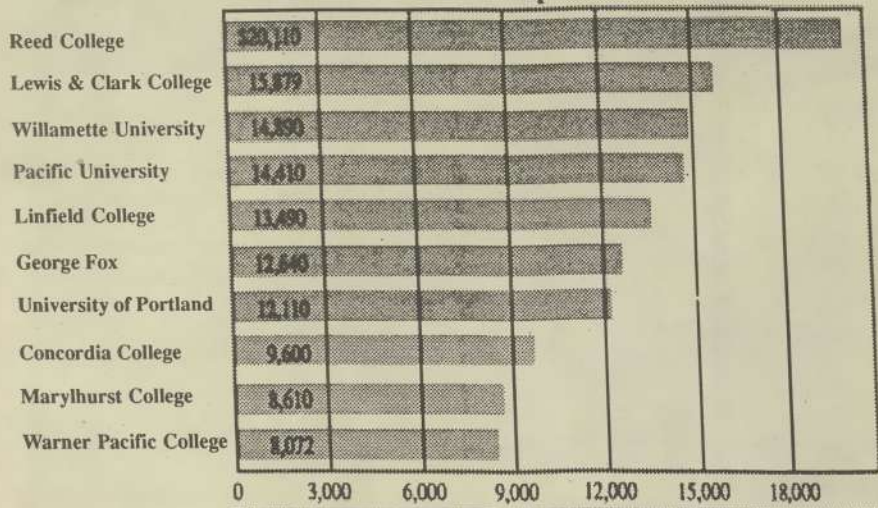
financial aid that year. The Financial Aid department generously handed out over 3 million dollars of aid to its students. With that kind of support, it's amazing everyone doesn't graduate.
