Golden eagle makes home at ELC

The John Inskeep Environmental Learning Center recently welcomed the newest addition to its "Birds of Prey" exhibit.

The new addition, Arapahoe, is a 20-year-old golden eagle from Moon Ridge Animal Park in Big Bear Lake, California. He has been at the Learning Center for almost two weeks, and will soon be able to take an active part in the "Birds of Prey" educational presentation.

Arapahoe has been in captivity since 1975, when he was shot in the shoulder and lost his right wing.

He has spent all of his captive life in educational programs and environmental centers, so he is very at home in the Inskeep Environmental center.

"The most striking thing about Arapahoe is his green eyes,"

said Katie Higgins-Wheeler, "Birds of Prey" assistant. "He is a very unique bird."

The ELC acquired Arapahoe through the Non-Releasable Animal Placement Program in Texas.

Although the arrival of a new bird is a joyous occasion, it does not come without some sorrow. Arapahoe is taking the place of the ELC's previous golden eagle, Kula.

Kula was a five-year-old female who died of chronic renal failure. She was a member of the "Birds of Prey" exhibit for three years, and her death is a great loss.

While Arapahoe is taking Kula's place, he will never be able to replace her memory.

The Environmental Learning Center is excited about Arapahoe, and they look forward to many years with him.

Students accept revised constitution

Associated Student Government adopted a new constitution after the student body vote last Friday.

According to Dawne Evans, campus events coordinator, a total of 48 people voted. There were 45 yes votes and 3 no votes. Evans said those numbers represented a "big turnout."

"It's really sad that more people don't take an active interest in decisions that affect them. If students don't take an active roll in those decisions, then they have to just accept whatever decisions are made for them," Evans said.

Evans, who has been involved with student government for six years said she became involved to be able to express her

opinions.

"I wanted to have a voice in decisions that were made about my future, about how I was going to be educated. Other students don't have to go so far, but they need to take the first step to say 'yes, I care about decisions that affect me, my education and my future,'" she said.

Evans said she is excited about the results of the election. She feels that adopting the new constitution allows ASG to better represent the students.

"The new constitution opens the way for us to more actively meet the needs of the students. But they need to take the step to come tell us what those needs are," Evans said.

Experience Israel in summer of '95

Clackamas Religion Instructor Bill Briare, his wife, Barb and Kris Boehike will be leading a 13-day trip to Israel, June 27 through July 9, 1995.

The main purposes of the trip are to be educational, fun, friendly and experiential.

According to the Briares and Boehike, there is much to learn in Israel, whether your interests are history, theology, archaeology, philosophy, geography or culture.

The group will be traveling as guests, not tourists, seeking to understand another country and another way of life.

The trip to Israel will include stops in Tel Aviv, Jerusalem and Galilee. Several different experiences and locations have been selected to give the complete flavor of the life of the Israeli people and their country.

The tour itinerary includes walks on the beach of the Mediterranean, a boat ride across the Sea of Galilee, a rafting trip on the Jordan River, an Israel folk show, a visit to Mt. Zion and the room of the last supper, a visit to King David's tomb, the Israel Museum, an archeological dig and a drive to the Dead Sea.

There is also time scheduled for travelers to enjoy time on their own. Nights are open for travelers to enjoy the Israeli night life. Tel Aviv is Israel's most energetic modern city, with nightclubs featuring a variety of rock, jazz, folk and pop music.

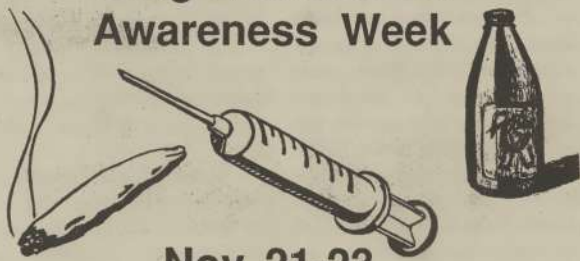
Price per person, in a double room, for the 13-day adventure is \$2,649. This price includes round-trip airfare from Portland to Tel Aviv via TWA, 11 night accommodations with Israeli breakfast and dinner daily, nine days of tours in a private, luxurious, air-conditioned bus, Falafel lunch in Haifa, an overnight at a Kibbutz, an Israeli folk show and a number of other adventures.

The only things not included in the price are departure taxes, lunch en route, drinks of any kind, personal expenses, travel insurance, tip for guide-driver, and tips to hotel and dining help.

Franklin Kline will be leading the fund-raising for this trip. There will be an information session at 7 p.m., Dec. 7, in room 102 of CCC's Harmony Campus.
