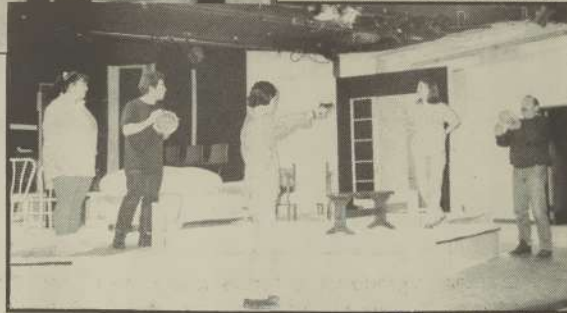
She is a single mother who is raising her son Pete (Matt Russell of Oregon City) on her own. She is always in the house
