Children and staff evacuated from FRC

✓ Due to a malfunctioning air-conditioner, daily activities were disrupted

About 60 children and staff members were evacuated from the Family Resource Center (FRC) and Camp Fire Child Care Center (CFCCC) Monday when a fan on an air conditioning unit overheated, causing the building to fill with smoke.

The Oregon City Fire Department, as well as public safety officials, responded to the scene, where children and staff of the child care center waited outside for officials to clear the building of smoke.

The driveway leading to the FRC parking lot was cordoned off, keeping parents and students from coming in while the clean-up process was taking place.

"The parking lot was closed. I just wanted to make sure everyone was OK, because I could hear the alarm."

"I felt a lot of concern. Es-

pecially because he [public safety official] didn't know anything (that was going on)," said Jenni Everett, mother and employee of Camp Fire Child Care Center.

Judy Kling, center director, also felt concern.

"There's always that initial rush of 'Oh my God!' But all systems set in, and it was OK. The kids got out, the fire engine came, parents didn't panic, and the staff knew what to do," she said.

CFCCC employee Elke Mayer arrived at work in the middle of the evacuation.

"My first reaction was, 'who pulled that alarm?' because the last two drills have been because of that. I just came over right away to help out," Mayer said.

While fire department officials worked to clear the building of smoke, children waited patiently outside.

"I was eating breakfast," ex-

Election day is fast approaching here on campus. On May 2 and 3, the student body will vote on next year's president and vice president.

Right now, there is one candidate, for President and two for vice president. Some write-ins are expected.

The candidate for president is Canby resident Mike Caudle, who is running his campaign with

vice president candidate Brenda Bellamy.

Caudle is currently an ASG legislative officer and Northwest Representative to the National Board of American Student Association of Community Colleges.

He has also served on all but one of the ASG committees, and has participated in lobbying trips to Salem and Washington, D.C. for education in the beginning of the year.

"I feel that there is not

enough student representation," Caudle said. "We need to focus on factors that affect student well-being, including child care, financial aid and other factors that may arise which may affect the general cost of our education here at Clackamas."

A wrestler for four years at Canby Union High School, Caudle plans to finish his transfer degree and obtain his master's degree in political science to teach at the college or high school level. His ultimate career goal is to be a wrestling coach.

Caudle is also responsible for the proposed constitutional amendments to the Student Constitution to be voted on at the same election.

Working with Bellamy for the benefit of the student body is his aspiration.

Bellamy is a graduate of Gladstone High School. Throughout her first year here at CCC, she has worked in ASG as a senator and on a number of committees.

"Mike and I work really well together," said Bellamy. "We have

a lot of opposite opinions, but find a common ground. ... I trust that he will make good decisions and we would be more effective together than we would be individually."

Bellamy said she is running because she has ideas and skills that she can put to use here.
