# Students elect Caudle, Bellamy

Student body elections are over. Last Tuesday and Wednesday, 253 students around campus and at the Harmony Center voted on Associated Student Government president and vice president for 1995-96, as well as proposed amendments to the constitution.

Ballots were counted and the following results were formally announced Monday.

Congratulations to Mike Caudle, who was elected ASG president with 171 votes, followed by write-in candidate Nate Smith with 39 votes. Other write-in candidates for president were Shane Reidman, Larry Buchanan, Wolfgang Von Kindberg, Jennifer Butler, Nate Brown, Ron Alioth and Matt Babbage.

Receiving a total of 147 votes, Caudle's running mate Brenda Bellamy was voted in as next year's vice president. Candidate Jennifer Butler followed close behind with 90 votes. Write-ins in this category included Larry Buchanan, Nate Smith and Katie Gillespie.

The proposed amendments to the Student Constitution were also approved with 182 "yes" votes and 30 "no" votes.
