Committee takes on recycling responsibility

Clackamas is working on a new, improved recycling program due to the closure of the Environmental Learning Center (ELC) recycling depot.

For the last eight years the ELC has done the recycling for Clackamas. By recycling, the college was able to cut its garbage bill in half. The college took the money it was saving and paid half of it back to ELC for their services.

About two years ago the college did some research and discovered that it could do its recycling for no cost.

At that point the college could not justify paying ELC for a service that it could get elsewhere for free. The ELC continued to do the college recycling even though they would no longer receive payment.

There had been some concern that recycling was not really taking place on campus.

"It (recycling) has been hap-

pening; it has not been happening to the degree it should have been," said Carol Patterson, associate dean of Plant Services, "Recycling in the past has been fair, a 'C' and that's pushing it."

The Environmental Committee has uncovered the fact that some recycling has not really been taking place.

"The huge display of recycling at the cafeteria was entirely a farce. Shortly you'll see that display being removed," said Ken Eshelman, environmental committee member. "With proper leadership like Carol Patterson, I expect that our campus can be brought up to date like the University of Oregon or Berkeley."

The school cafeteria was surprised to find out that the recycling was not taking place and will revise or take down the display, according to Eshelman.

The ELC tried to do a good job of recycling. They had the right idea, but were unable to follow through.

Elections for next year's ASG approach

Elections for the only two elective CCC Associated Student Government (ASG) positions, president and vice-president, will be held May 8 and 9, and results of the elections should be available May 10.

The polling booth for voting will be set up either inside or outside the Community Center, depending on weather conditions.

As of yesterday's application deadline, two candidates have applied for each position: Incumbent ASG President Mike Caudle and Clare Chevalier for president; and current ASG member Jake Boenisch and Jeri Scarborough for the vice-presidential position being vacated by outgoing vice-president Brenda Bellamy.

Having just two applicants for ASG positions so near the deadline is not unusual, according to outgoing vice-president Bellamy. Last year only one candidate ran for president and two ran for vice-president. The year before, only one candidate ran for

each.

"Generally students within student government are the people that run," said Bellamy. "That doesn't mean others can't run, because most students are eligible."

Students interested in serving in ASG who missed the deadline for the top two positions can run for one of the 14 remaining ASG positions. The ASG Senate comprises 10 of those positions while four positions are held by officers. The president and vice-president make up the remainder of the 16 positions. All the non-elective one-year senate and officer positions become vacant at the end of spring term.

One of the responsibilities of the new president will be to fill
