1996-97 ASG presidential elections next week

Incumbent ASG President Mike Caudle will be facing Clare Chevalier in the ASG Presidential election.

Caudle's campaign is largely based on his achievements throughout the 1995-96 school year. In talking about his accomplishments, Caudle said that, over the past year, he has saved students \$120,000 in a tuition battle, \$10,000 increased funding for Childcare Grant Program, Pro-Student votes on financial aid from U.S. Congress and a successful Bookmart. Caudle added that, if re-elected, "at the end of next year, I want this year's accomplishments to seem small."

Caudle plans on continuing the growth of the Childcare Grant Program, continuing the Bookmart, fighting to increase money allocated to financial aid, improving recycling on campus and carrying student's concerns to the administration.

Norm Berney, ASG's advisor,

said Caudle "is very aware of student needs and faculty concerns."

Caudle is the Vice-Chair of Community Colleges of Oregon Student Association (CCOSAC). Caudle is also the northwest regional vice-president of the American Student Association of Community Colleges (ASACC). Caudle has been President of ASG since the fall term of the 1995-96 school year.

Clare Chevalier is currently attending CCC as a Nursing major. Chevalier wants to get the Bookmart expanded, so "that graduating students can sell their books. Right now, they really can't...they'd have to come back in September."

Chevalier also wants to continue funding for the day care program, along with establishing a "disc golf course" and providing students with more than one type of vendor in the cafeteria.

"I would also like to bring a new focus to CCC. A

lot of CCC students are commuters, but I think (Clackamas) can have more of an identity." Chevalier added that he would like to bring more focus to (the)

Nursing department.

Chevalier's past political experience includes serving as a class representative for the Nursing department, and membership in Forensics.

Nancy Wilson, and Instructor in CCC's Nursing department, said Chevalier "...has really helped the class come together." Wilson added that Chevalier is "a good, solid, caring person...he cares about people. He knows about people."

Current ASG members compete for V.P.

Elections for ASG President and Vice President are rapidly approaching.

On May 8 and 9, all Clackamas Community College students will be able to vote for candidates running for ASG's President and Vice President.

There are two candidates running for the Vice President position. Jacob Boenisch, currently an ASG Senator and Jeri Scarborough, currently ASG's Administrative Assistant.

Boenisch's platform includes "getting clubs better recognition and more participation, continuing the fight for more student aid, making child care more accessible and available to students in need,

continuing Bookmart--a student book exchange that allows students to sell their books for the amount they choose--and making sure that night students get more benefits," according to information found in ASG's voter pamphlet.

Norm Bernie, ASG's advisor said Boenisch "is a very verbal person...however, his background and experience hasn't really given me the chance to see him in a true leadership position."

"To most people around here, I have a familiar face. People have seen me. I've talked to them," said Boenisch. "...I think we [Boenisch or Scarborough] would both do a good job as Vice-President...she's just as determined as I am."

Boenisch's political experi-

ence includes a leadership class offered by CCC President John Keyser, along with membership in American Student Association of Community Colleges (ASACC) and attending Community Colleges of Oregon Student Association and Commission (CCOSAC) conferences and meetings. Boenisch is currently an ASG Senator.

Scarborough says, if elected as Vice President, that she will "try to improve the focus of campus clubs, provide a voice for fellow night students, continued support for child care grants, increased visibility of Bookmart and establish awareness of student opportunities."
