Early Fall, Summer registration approach

There are many registration dates and events coming up that both new and returning students should know about.

Early Fall Registration

Early Fall registration for the 1996-97 school year will take place next week for returning students.

Classes are guaranteed for students who register for Fall classes between May 20-24 and pay for them by August 29.

Students registered for Spring term should have already received their scheduling letter in the mail telling them the time and date of their advising/scheduling appointments.

Those students who would like to schedule early for Fall but have not registered by appointment can call ext. 2770 for more information.

Summer Registration

Summer registration begins May 28 for both new and returning students.

Drivers Education

Drivers Education Registration begins May 28, at 5:30 p.m.

Telephone Registration

Telephone registration runs from May 28 through June 23 between the hours of 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. New and returning students

planning to register for seven credits or less during the summer may use this service. There is \$3 charge. Instructions for touchtone telephone registration can be found in the Summer Schedule of Classes.

Intensive Spanish

For those students enrolling in Summer term and interested in taking Spanish, Clackamas is offering an intensive Spanish course this summer, June 17-August 14.

In nine weeks, students can complete an entire year of Spanish (SPN 101, 102 and 103) and earn 12 college credits.

This course is recommended for those people wanting to meet graduation or admissions requirements, travel, learn about neighboring cultures or increase their language skills in today's global marketplace.

Classes will be held Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to noon. Tuition and fees for this intensive course is \$420. Students may take one or two of the sections for \$140 per section. SPN101 begins June 17, SPN102 begins July 8 and SPN 103 begins July 29.

Caudle, Scarborough elected to ASG office

The results are in for ASG's Presidential and Vice-Presidential races.

Incumbent Mike Caudle won the Presidential race with 156 votes. The only other student running in the Presidential election was Clare Chevalier who obtained 58 votes.

In the Vice-Presidential race, Jeri Scarborough won with 145 votes. Jacob Boenisch, currently an ASG Senator, garnered 65 votes.

The Presidential race had two write-in candidates -- Brandon Freels, who received 10 write-in votes, and Lee Eby who received four votes. In the Vice-Presidential race, write-in candidate Paul Coffey obtained 10 votes.

Ken Eshelman, a Legislative officer for ASG, said that Caudle and Scarborough "...should work very well together as they have proven to be very compatible."

A total of 234 students voted in this year's election. Last year's Presidential and Vice-Presidential races had 253 student voters.

Rock the Vote today

The Associated Student Government and Phi Theta Kappa are presenting *Rock the Vote* today.

A table will be set up in the Community Center Mall with voting information and voters' registration cards between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. There will be a dee-jay playing music and snacks will be available.

PTK will be holding a Candidate Forum from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Candidates John Foote, Tom Civiletti, Sharon Scott, Shirley Gold, Bill Dwyer and Harry Lonsdale will be speaking in the Gregory Forum.

The idea behind *Rock the Vote* is to encourage students to participate in the election process, by exercising their right to vote.

SPECIAL EVENT—Steinman to share poetry Friday

Lisa Steinman, Kenan Professor of English and Humanities at Reed College, will be giving a free reading from her works of poetry at noon on Friday in the Gregory Forum.

Steinman is the author of four books: one book about American poetry, *Made in America* and three volumes of poetry, *Lost Poems*, *All That Comes to Light* and *A Book of Other Days*. She also edits the poetry magazine *Hubbub* with Jim Shugrue.

She was a winner of the Oregon Book Award in 1993. Her work has also received recognition from the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Rockefeller Foundation.
