Jason Mann had three triple-run homers; two were against SWOCC and the other

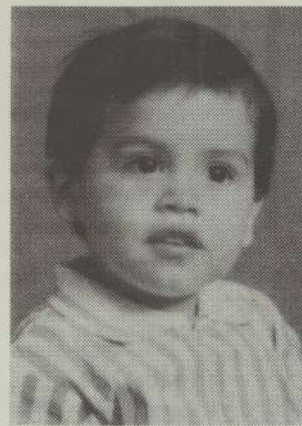
in a game against Chemeketa.

On Sunday, Clackamas played Mt. Hood and lost 15-8, which put the Cougars in a tie for the league championship.

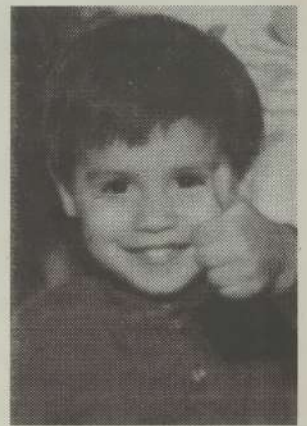

Cougar track teams take third at NWAACC championship

The Clackamas Community College Track Team saw both its men and women athletes take third place at the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) Southern Region Championships.

The NWAACC Southern Region Championships were held March 10 and 11, at Willamette University in Salem. The Cougars finished third in both the men's and women's team scores, with point totals of 134 for the men and 123 for the women.

"It was expected on the men's side, but on the women's side there were three teams competing that had beat us during the year. The women really responded well and rose to the occasion," said Clackamas Head Track Coach Mike Hodges.

The Cougars had several great individual performances led by Melissa Abramson. Abramson finish second in the Individual High Point Trophy competition by

half a point; she had 36 and a half points total for the track meet. Abramson also won two events for the Cougars by taking first place in the women's 100 meter hurdles and the women's 400 meter hurdles. Abramson's time of 15.25 seconds in the 100 was the sixth highest mark in Clackamas history for that event. Abramson's 400 mark of 1 minute 4.79 seconds was fourth all-time in the school record books.

"Considering the people who are competing for us at this time, I've thought we've competed very well," said Hodges.

Clackamas had several other top competitors in the NWAACC Southern Region Championships. Cougar Evan Goin won the men's 10,000 meter run with a personal record time of 33:25.28 seconds. Pole Vaulter Bill Hurford took first place in his event with a mark of 15 feet six inches. Wanjeria Washington placed high in the women's 400 meter hurdles and in the women's high jump. Washington had a time of 1:05.86 in

the hurdles, the eighth best mark in school history. Washington cleared a height of 5 feet in the high jump and tied for second with fellow Cougar Misty Forgey. Other top performers for the Cougars included Shawn Davis, Ryan Burck and Kasey Johnson. Davis finished second in the shot put and the men's hammer throw with marks of 46' 2 1/2" and 156' 5". Burck finished second in the men's 3000 meter steeplechase with a mark of 9:54.46. Johnson also achieved a second place finish in the men's 800 meter run with a time of 1:57.80. In a group effort, the women's 400 meter relay team finished second in the track meet with a time of 49.99 seconds.

The Cougars' next match will be the NWAACC Championships held in Gresham this Thursday and Friday.

"They (NWAACC) have a trophy for the top three teams. We have a goal to come home with a trophy on the men's and women's side," said Hodges.
