Student wins USA Today Scholarship

The college is proud to announce the nomination of Christy Hurt as a member of the First Team of the All-USA Academic Team for Community and Junior Colleges.

Hurt was in Anaheim, Calif. on Monday to attend a recognition ceremony during the 77th Annual American Association of Community Colleges Convention.

Hurt, along with Laney Fouse, Editor-in-Chief of *The Clackamas Print* were among 1250 students across the nation who were chosen last December to participate in the competition. The purpose of the program is to recognize students who excel in the classroom and demonstrate an ability to share their educational talents with others.

"It was really difficult keeping Christy's nomination a secret until *USA Today*, who sponsors the event, released it in yesterday's newspaper. We found out at the end of February and I

was probably more excited for her than she was," said Fouse.

According to Allen Widerberg, English instructor and Writers' Club faculty advisor, "Clackamas has an excellent creative writing program and has produced many fine students. Christy is probably the best poet we have yet seen."

"Her concern always seems to focus on the welfare of others. She works hard at helping other students succeed. [She] is both tough and compassionate, intelligent and gifted, hardworking and wise," said Widerberg.

Hurt is currently pursuing a degree in order to teach English and writing at the college level.

The criteria for nomination adheres to some strict standards. Judging consists of four different rounds. The scoring is based on academic recognition, honors, awards, activities, leadership, community service, work experience and the student's essay.

Internationally renowned composer Peter Schickele will be performing April 17 at the Oregon City Evangelical Church.

Peter Schickele, who made famous the name of PDQ Bach, will perform original compositions April 17, during Song Cycle, a program sponsored by the college.

The internationally renowned composer and satirist will perform beginning at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow, April 17, at the Oregon City Evangelical Church, 1024 Linn Avenue, Oregon City.

Tickets are \$15 in advance for general admission and \$6 in advance for students and senior citizens. Tickets are \$17 and \$8 at the door.

Schickele also will lead a master class, closed to the public, for Clackamas students this Friday, April 18, on the main campus.

Composer, musician, author, satirist-Schickele is internationally recognized as one of the most versatile artists in the music world. His works, now well in excess of 100 for symphony orchestras, choral groups, chamber ensembles, voice and movies and television have given Schickele "a leading role in the ever-more-prominent school of American composers who unselfconsciously blend all levels of American music," according to the *New York Times*.

As much as for his numerous commissions, movie scores and his weekly, syndicated radio program, Schickele is renowned as the creator of PDQ Bach, the "lost" member of the famous Bach family. Schickele's

invention of the fabled genius produced 11 albums, an opera, a book (now in its eleventh printing), four Grammy Awards and earned Schickele a reputation as one of the Twentieth Century's great satirists.

Schickele's radio show, Schickele Mix, is heard nationwide on National Public Radio and won ASCAP's prestigious Deems Taylor Award. He has created music for four feature films, as well as for documentaries, television commercials and programs and the Broadway musical, "Oh, Calcutta." He has arranged for folk stars Joan Baez, Buffy Sainte-Marie and others.

Born in Ames, Iowa, raised in Washington D.C. and Fargo, North Dakota, Schickele graduated from Swarthmore in 1957 as the only music major. He began his career as a teacher at Julliard, but gave it up to compose and perform. He and his wife, poet Susan Sindall, live in New York City.

Peter Schickele's program, Song Cycle, is presented by ICM Artists and the college. The performance had originally been scheduled for Gregory Forum; however, the forum is closed during spring and summer terms to make needed repairs, creating the need to move the performance to Oregon City Evangelical Church.

The program is being organized and sponsored by the college Cultural Arts Committee using proceeds from the college foundation.
