Sound like a line-up of famous writers who might be appearing in a prestigious reading at the Schnitz in downtown Portland? Yes - they're famous . . . and they're all on the faculty in the Clackamas English Department. But their prestigious reading is right here, on Friday, at noon in the McLoughlin Theater.

Entitled "Luck and Love" in honor of Valentine's Day, the reading will feature Diane Averill, Craig Lesley, Kate Gray, Jeff Knorr, Sue Mach and Tim Schell. Together this group of writers/teachers has published seven books (with two more forthcoming) and many poems, short stories and essays.

"This is an outstanding chance for our students to see - in one place - the kind of talent we have on the staff," said English Department Chair Tom Richards. "We welcome students and staff members to take this opportunity during the day to hear these folks read. It's a kind of Valentine gift from the English Department."

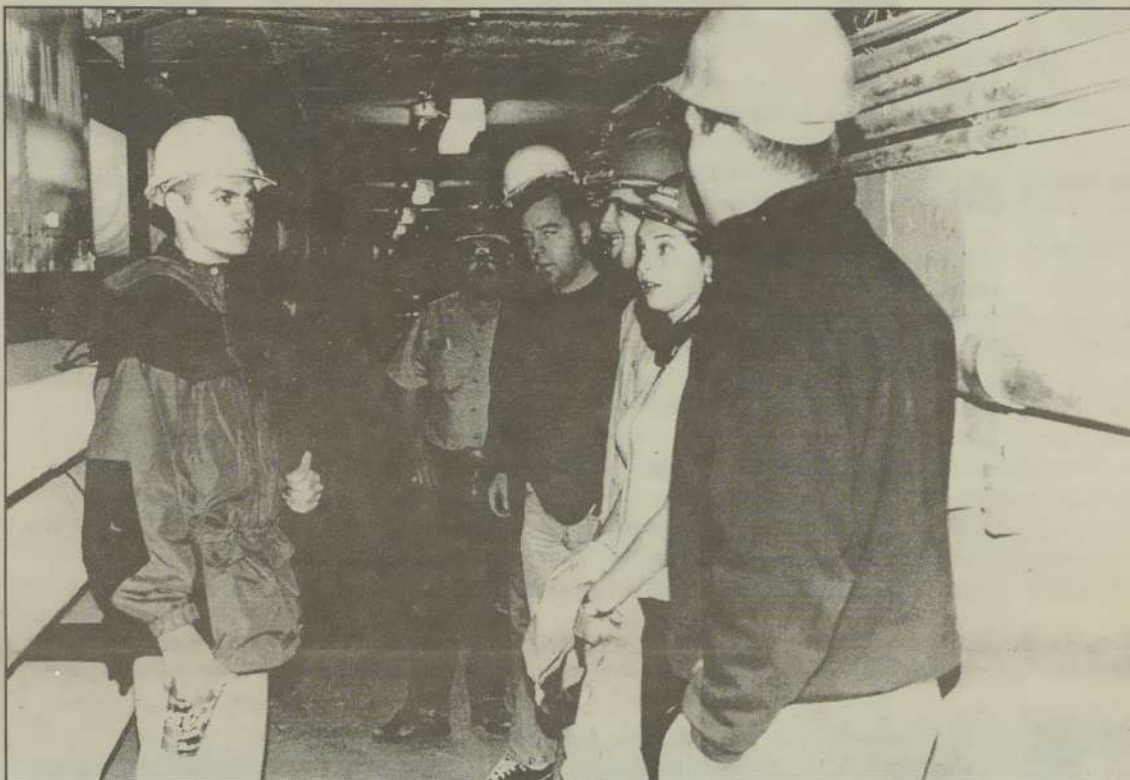
Richards also noted that two of the instructors, Diane Averill and Jeff Knorr, will each have books of their poetry published in the near future, joining the ranks of several other instructors with published works.

Richards also noted that this is a special event for another reason.

Career Center a valuable resource

Nestled in its own little corner of the Community Center lies a wealth of information for all Clackamas students just for the asking.

The Career Center provides help with everything from career planning, to school scholarship information, to how to write a resume.

Career Resource Specialist Ethel Swanson and Job Specialist Rosemary Jane are dedicated to helping students understand the vast amount of information available to them through the career center.

Ethel Swanson, herself a Clackamas graduate, knows firsthand how expensive college can be, and it is her job to help students use the center's CIS (Career Information System). The system allows students to explore the many different career fields that are out there and also shows information about the thousands of scholarships that are available.

There is a large library in the center that contains books on just about every aspect of career planning. Books cover topics on writing a resume, putting together a career portfolio and stories of inspiration about people returning to school, pursuing a new career and how it changed their lives.

The bulletin boards hold a wide array of topics including a ten-year job projection of the most sought after jobs and success stories about people who returned to school and started their own business.

Job Specialist Rosemary Jane offers a huge amount of employment information from current job listings to possible summer employment. Jane works closely with many agencies looking for qualified employees in hundreds of different fields. Although the Career Center is not a job placement service, there are many job listings available for students to pursue on their own time.

Clackamas to hire 18 new instructors

New faces will be showing up around campus as a result of many instructor, classified staff and administrative positions becoming available between early March and mid April according to Dean of Instructional Services Liz Goulard.

A total of 18 full-time instructor positions are available. Six classified staff and six administrative staff positions are also opening up during this academic year. The areas of instruction range from mathematics to English, computer science, health, psychology and many more.

A Career Opportunities press release lists the positions in greater detail along with specific requirements and closing dates for applications.

"Many of the people retiring are among those who built the school and made it what it is today," said Liz Goulard. "We will suffer a loss of talent when they leave, but it's also a great opportunity for us as well. It's a chance to chart our future course at Clackamas."

This could be the single largest hiring in many years. According to Goulard, "hiring the right people is the most important thing we can do."

Due to the high number of new employees expected at Clackamas, several programs are being implemented to improve the new employee orientation program, Goulard said. One program on the agenda is a mentoring program. It is designed to link new employees with a mentor from experienced Clackamas faculty. It also makes a connection between them and someone from another campus area.
