Clackamas Head Coach Denise Nasuta is all smiles this week.

After her team's seventh straight victory, the Cougars control their own destiny.

Clackamas hosted Grays Harbor Community College yesterday in a doubleheader and claimed victories in both contests.

In the first game, the Cougars jumped all over the visiting team of Washington and earned a 8-0 win in five innings.

In the nightcap, the Cougars were ahead 7-0 heading into the fifth inning but no official results were available at press time.

On Monday, Clackamas completed a delayed doubleheader with the Mt. Hood Saints.

The two games were scheduled to take

place Friday evening but only one game was played due to rain.

The Cougars played perfect defense as they cruised to a rare 7-0 win over the third-place Saints.

Against Mt. Hood on Friday, Clackamas lost a 4-3 heartbreaker.

"Monday's win was a great win for us," said Nasuta. "We finally played with intensity from start to finish and made no errors. We played the way we can play."

Over the weekend, the fifth-place Cougars netted four wins over Olympic and Green River.

On Saturday, Clackamas sluggers unleashed for 25 runs in two games. Freshman Billie Williams led the

Volleyball Camp

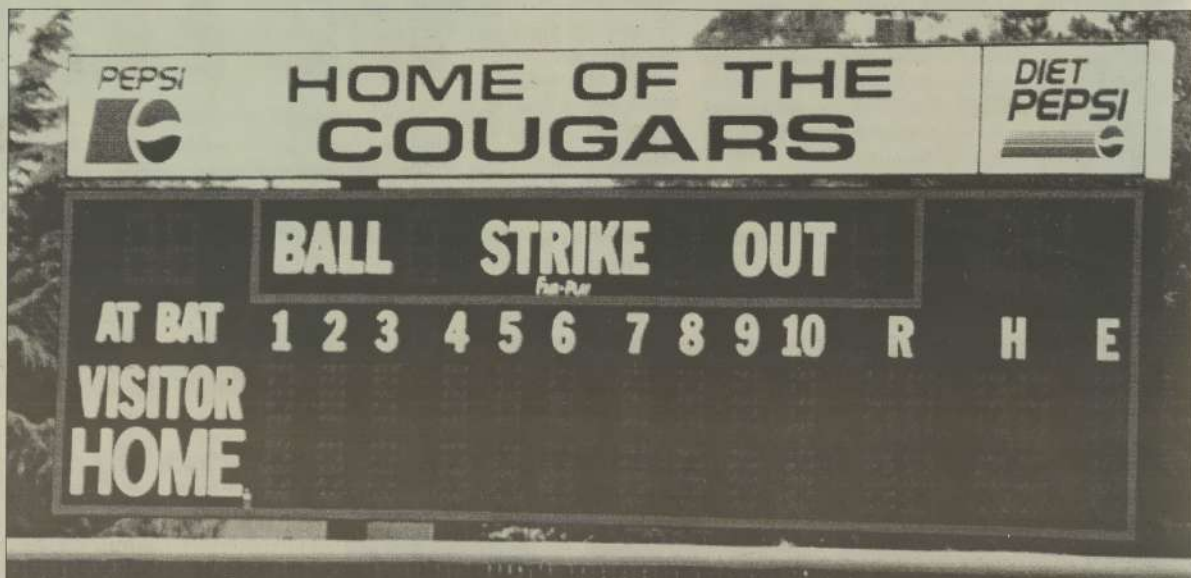
Piper Volleyball Camps will be held this year in five locations.

Defense wins championships!

The Clackamas baseball team has learned this the hard way.

The Cougars played six games last week and committed at least three errors in every game.

Clackamas traveled to Albany on Tuesday, April 28 to play a doubleheader against Linn-Benton. The Cougars

overcame six errors to win the first game but couldn't overcome four in game two and came away with a split.

Clackamas used four-run innings in the fifth and ninth to record an 11-10 victory.

Freshman Kelly Corliss led the Cougar attack, which pounded out 14 hits, going 4-5 with a double and four runs batted in. Sophomore Ryan Suyama was 3-5 with a double, three runs scored and three RBI's. Sophomores Josh Kelsey and Jeff Berard had two hits apiece and combined to score three runs and drive in four.

Sophomore pitcher Robert Kinnee pitched 2 1/3 innings in relief to pick up the win.

Game two saw excellent pitching from both teams.

Freshman Art Salinas gave up three runs early, then settled down and shut out the Roadrunners the rest of the way. Clackamas could only manage six hits in the game and fell to defeat, 3-2. Salinas pitched five innings, allowing two earned runs on five hits despite being credited with the loss.

The following day, the Cougars hosted a doubleheader against Linfield JV in non-league action. Clackamas swept the Wildcats, 11-5 and 9-5. Corliss continued his offensive

outburst, going 5-8 in the doubleheader with two doubles, a triple, a homerun, four runs, and two RBI's.

Sophomore reliever Jeff Williamson picked up his fourth and fifth saves in the doubleheader.
