## Costa Rican visitors tour campus

A group of retired professionals from Costa Rica visited the Environmental Learning Center on October 20, as part of the Retired Person's Exchange Program coordinated by Foreign Language Department Chair Carlota Holley.

The 22 Costa Rican visitors also attended a lunch hosted by Clackamas' Spanish Club, *Entre Amigos*, held the same day in the

new Foreign Language Lab on the second floor of Barlow Hall.

The group from Costa Rica arrived in Portland October 7, and will be visiting for a month while staying with host families at various locations around the metro area.

During the month they will be visiting the Capitol at Salem, Mount Hood, the Aquarium in Newport as well as Washington Park in Portland, also on the itinerary will be visits to the Japanese Gardens, the Portland Center for the Performing Arts and Silver

Falls State Park east of Salem where they will spend the night.

"Students of Spanish will be available to show the various aspects of the Clackamas Campus and its programs so that the Costa Ricans will have a greater understanding of community colleges in the United States, since these do not exist in that country," said Holley.

The visitors will also have an opportunity to visit the classes on campus and speak with students in the Spanish language.

The Retired Person's Exchange

Program that coordinates the inter-americas' visits here in Oregon is in its eleventh year, said Holly.

The Oregon Chapter is part of a national program called Partners of the Americas, founded in 1964 under President John F. Kennedy's Alliance for Progress agenda.

"Partners of the Americas is the largest volunteer organization in the Western Hemisphere and exists to foster and promote inter-American friendships, cooperation, understanding and social and economic development," said Holley.

The program works by matching each of the states with one of a Central American, South American or Caribbean country. Oregon has been paired with Costa Rica and is a pioneer with the Retired Person's Exchange cultural program.

Every year for the past 10 years a group from Costa Rica travels to Oregon in October, while a group from Oregon has traveled to Costa Rica in January.

Over 550 individuals have taken part in the exchange since it was started.

## Foundation seeks money for statue

The Clackamas Community College Foundation announced that they wish to purchase "Shared Destinies," a 12-foot high steel sculpture on display in front of the Community Center, and permanently display the sculpture on campus.

Devin Laurence Field created the sculpture for the 1998 CCC Sculpture Exposition that took place on campus in the Spring of 1998.

"I sculpt animal subjects as tributes rather than as ornaments... It is about form, history, archetypes and myth," said Field.

The artwork features two drought horses pulling against each other. The artist is representing the pioneer spirit of the West in the 19th century.

The artwork will cost \$18,000, with \$16,000 still needed to finalize the purchase and add the sculpture to the permanent collection at CCC, said Foundation Assistant Director Beverly Fulmore.
