"We don't skip a beat when Jonathan is in there," wide receiver Roddy Tompkins said. "If anything, we step it up. The way he throws gives receivers a chance to make a play."

Smith has much better throwing touch than Bryant does, especially on the deep ball. Bryant has a tendency to overthrow on the long pass, were as Smith gets air under the ball, giving receivers a chance to make the catch.

"He's always got the best touch on the deep ball," Head Coach Mike Riley said.

Riley had originally planned to only use Smith sparingly against Washington —just enough to give him experience in a hostile environment.

Smith changed all that though, when he lead OSU on a 98 yard scoring drive to pull OSU within 28-21, forcing Coach Riley to choose which quarterback to use from now on.

Smith didn't just change Oregon State's quarterbacking situation, though; he may have forever changed the fortunes of Oregon State football.

## Clackamas runner wins title

### Cougars have strong showing in Southern Region meet

The Cross Country Team had a good weekend.

The Cougars competed in the Southern Region Championships at Bush Park in Salem on Saturday netting a second place finish in the men's race and a fourth place spot in the women's.

Clackamas runner Ahrlin Bauman won the race —beating rival Jeremy Kirk from Mt. Hood by four seconds.

"Ahrlin had an incredible race," said Clackamas Head Coach Mike Hickey. "Both him and Jeremy [Kirk] ran close pretty much the whole race then Ahrlin really threw his kick down and broke away in the last 400 to 500 meters."

Bauman's time of 25:55 pulled himself even with Kirk as each runner has defeated the other on the same course this season.

Paul Kezes was the next Clackamas runner to complete the race.

Kezes crossed the line in

10th in a time of 26:51 while Chris Chatfield finished in 26:54 for 11th place.

Tim Winter [27:03] finished 13th, Andy Monhead [27:10] crossed the line for 16th, Andrew Wall [27:18] followed for 18th while Brad Limbauch [27:46] came in at the 26th spot.

In the women's race, Tyana Moralez went out for the win but finished in 19:42 for 5th place.

"It's a risk when you go out and try to win a race," noted Hickey. "She went out and really pushed herself. For the first mile and a half she was just off the leader. It was a very tough race and sometimes going out and trying to win the race doesn't help you."

Tiffany Edwards was the second Cougar to finish in a time of 20:37.

Emily Schmierer followed in 17th at 20:47, Erin Stapish [22:06] in 32nd and Jamie Reidy [24:57] in 39th rounded out the Clackamas runners.

"Jamie was very sick going into this meet," said Coach

Hickey. "She came up to us and said she wanted to race, though, and she went out and really sacrificed a lot of pride for her team. You don't see too many athletes do that anymore."

Overall, Clackamas placed 3rd in the combined team standings.

"It was a very good day for us," added Hickey. "We had eight personal records broken and we had 10 runners that ran 28 minutes or faster, and that is awesome."

"It was a very interesting tactical race to watch. The Mt. Hood runners tried to throw off Ahrlin by switching leaders in front of him a few times. He just stuck with them and won it."

Next up for Clackamas is the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges championships, which is two weeks away in Spokane.

Host Spokane is favored to win the title and is believed to be one of the top teams in the nation, according to Coach Hickey.

"We're going to go train up near Mt. Hood where it is colder and the elevation is higher," added Hickey. "We'll train hard this week then back off some to get ready."
