As part of the assignment, the photographers were required to carry along pencil and paper for recording caption information, to simulate working on an actual newspaper.

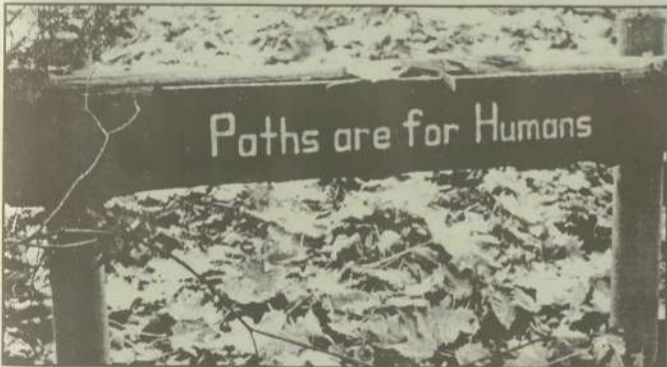
Photojournalism can be taken during Fall Term and is the only class offered at Clackamas in which aspiring photographers can learn their trade.



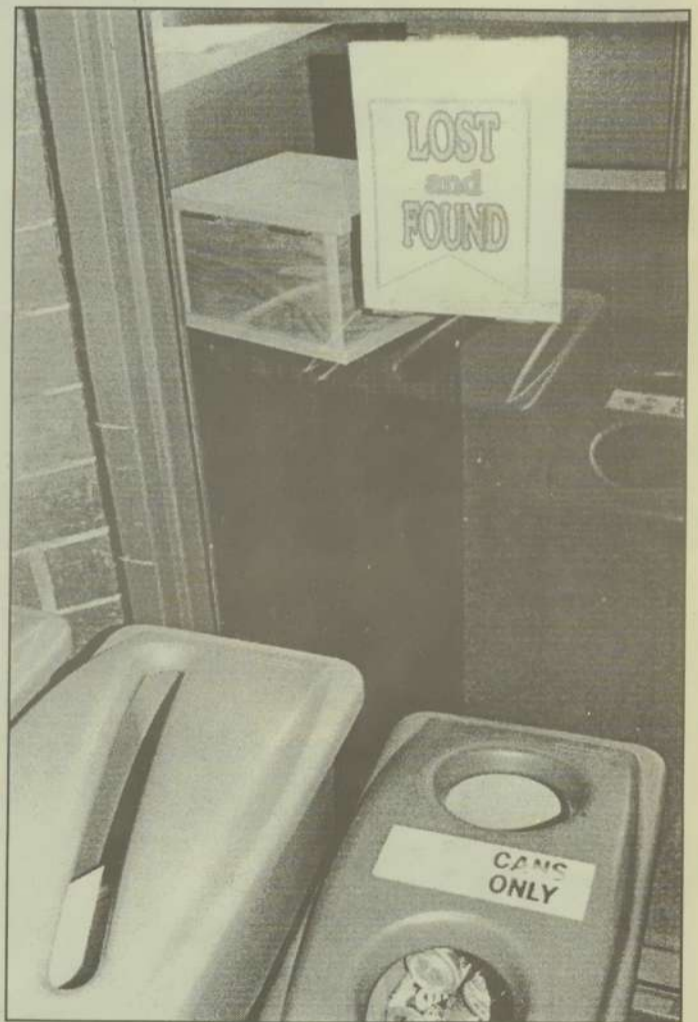

A lone sign stands by the wooded paths of the ELC, directing bipedal visitors to their prescribed boundaries.

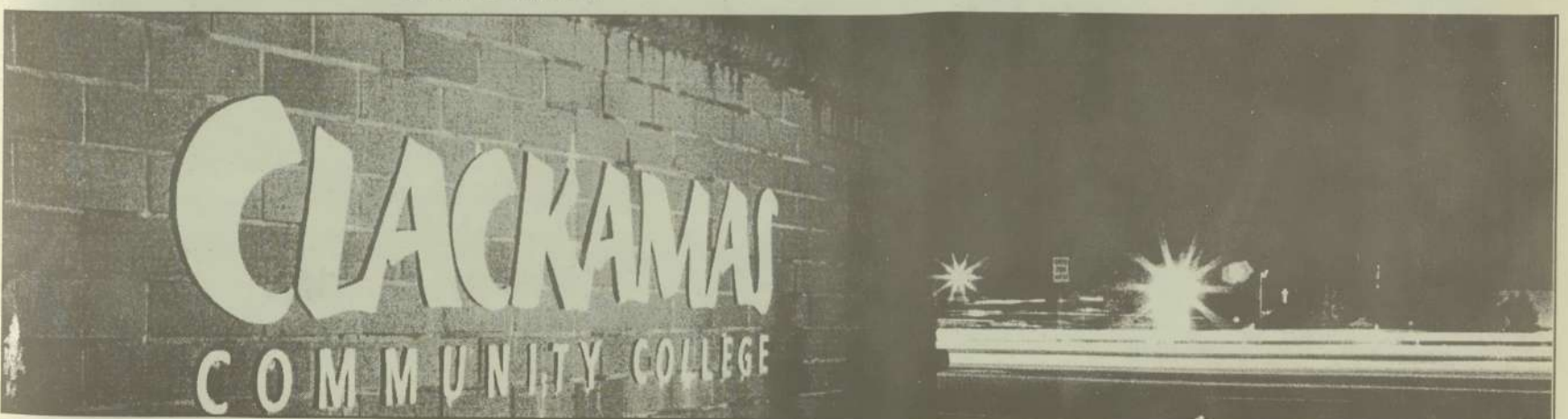
