"A lot of students, former students and even some of her soror-

ity sisters from college were there," she said. "I think MaryAnn would have been amazed at how many people came to the memorial."

Mrs. Miller was a well-liked Business Administration Instructor here at Clackamas from 1989 to the present and before coming to Clackamas taught for two years at Mt. Hood Community College. She also taught business classes at Gresham and David Douglas high

schools before becoming a college instructor.

She was named Teacher of the Year in the 1960s, and Clackamas Faculty Member of the Year in 1995. The recipient of that honor is a Banyon Pin Award winner, a symbol of excellence at Clackamas.

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Board of Education picks architect firm to plan changes

The Clackamas Community College Board of Education, in a unanimous decision at the Nov. 12 board meeting, chose the Portland architectural firm of Yost Grube Hall to evaluate and develop the Master Plan that will pave the way for building projects on into the next century.

College President Dr. John Keyser said that the architectural firm will help define the projects the board wants to accomplish with the next bond issue vote.

"We will be doing a lot of shaping of all this, to clarify our thinking on these projects and how much they will cost," said Keyser.

Yost Grube Hall has been given a budget of \$35,000 to begin the long process of evaluation. Keyser said that part of that evaluation will

be input from the faculty, students and the community using open forums over the next year.

The firm won out over another Portland architectural firm, SRG Partnership. The bids were evaluated by a committee of college administrators and instructors who selected from a total of 13 firms making proposals before narrowing the choice down to the two finalists.

One of the major projects in the Master Plan is a new Communications/Arts Center to be built on the current site of the softball field adjacent to Randall Hall.

Yost Grube Hall has worked on 20 projects on six different campuses for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, including the Master Plan Developments for Portland State University. They are also the associate architects for a new Law School building at Seattle

University, and have designed a Student Recreation Center and for Washington State as well as a Tourism Learning Center on Saipan.

The evaluation by the firm will take into consideration other projects in the area planned by Clackamas County, which wants to move county offices into buildings they will build near here. A decision by county commissioners will take place in early December.

Another consideration is a new high school for the Oregon City School District, but that project is now on hold because of the failure of a \$69.5 million bond issue at the Nov. 3 elections.

Keyser stated they have only so much money for the architects to work with before a similar bond issue campaign can get under way.

"We will try to get as far as we can with the amount budgeted," he said.

The Clackamas Volleyball team concluded its 1998 campaign at the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges [NWAACC] championships last weekend in Walla Walla, Wash.

The Cougars [11-1, 45-9], who entered the tournament with an NWAACC ranking of #2, finished their season as the #2 team—losing to Chemeketa 12-15, 15-17, 4-15 in the final on Saturday night.

"It was a good ending to an awesome season," said Head Coach Kathie Woods. "We would have liked to win the NWAACC Championship, but second place is still awesome."

Clackamas opened the tournament against the #3 seed from the East in Big Bend Com-

munity College. The Vikings from Moses Lake, Wash. played the role of a giant killer as it surprised teams—placing fourth.

The Cougars, fresh from back-to-back wins over Chemeketa a week earlier, jumped out early to win games one and two. The Vikings rebounded to win game three before bowing out to Clackamas in game four for the Cougars' 15-13, 15-3, 5-15, 15-7 victory.

Sophomores Michelle McKinney and Amy Kraljev each had 12 kills while Judi Arbuckle had 16 digs.

"Big Bend had an incredible tournament," noted Coach Woods. "They really surprised some teams, I think. It shows how strong the whole NWAACC really was this year."

Big Bend eliminated Pierce College and Skagit Valley College, region champions from the West and North, before claiming the fourth place trophy.
