Goulard takes new position at Chemeketa

Liz Goulard, Dean of Instructional Services since 1994, is leaving Clackamas to work as the Vice President of Academic Services at Chemeketa Community College in Salem.

"I feel like I'm going back home," Goulard said, who started her teaching career as a part-time nursing instructor at Chemeketa in 1980. "This is where I started my community college career."

However, making the decision to apply for the open position wasn't easy. Goulard admits that she had no interest in leaving Clackamas, but when the opportunity presented itself she felt it was something she needed to assess.

"There are a lot of new challenges that I will face and I'm looking forward to this learning opportunity," Goulard said.

During her five years as Dean of Instructional Services, Goulard has made a huge impact on many facets of the college. She was one of the initial advocates and originators of distance learning and it was her active work with the faculty and administration that established the partnership with Portland State University.

Up until a few years ago, the Environmental Learning Center was a non-profit independent organization and Goulard made it possible to move the institution into the college.

Goulard was introduced to Clackamas while she was working on her doctorate and interned with John Keyser. She said she knew immediately that the college was an exceptional example of quality education. Goulard jumped at the chance to climb on board as the Dean of Instructional Services. "Clackamas is a wonderful institution and I will miss the people especially."

"I think it's a tough choice to make [to move on]," said Connet. "I have a lot of respect for people who go through something like that."

Goulard will be leaving her position at the end of this term.
