



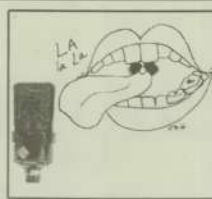

The theme "Girl Force" will reign on campus tomorrow from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. as Clackamas participates in the ninth annual National Take Our Daughters to Work Day, sponsored by the Ms. Foundation for Women.

Activities will begin with an internet scavenger hunt at 11 a.m. in Streeter Hall, 143. A noon lunch in the Gregory Forum follows with pizza and drinks, a skit by CCC's Comedy Improvisational Troupe *Cat Sausage* and motivational speaker, CCC student Yvonne Ingram. Lunch is \$10 for adults and free for children.

Clackamas activities are sponsored by the Connections program, the local chapter of the American Association of Women in Community Col-

leges.

From 1:30 to 2:30 p.m., the Environmental Learning Center will host a tour and hands-on science and environmental awareness projects to complete the day's activities.

The National Take Our Daughters to Work Day focuses on exposing girls to different opportunities available to them in the working world, both traditional and non-traditional. According to the *Monthly Labor Review*, 46% of our nation's workforce is women, with wider ranges of occupations available to them now than ever before. Allowing girls to watch others at work helps heighten their aspirations for the future.

Placing first in state at Mt. Hood C.C., the speech and debate team receives 24 trophies and places in 10 of 11 categories

The Clackamas Speech and Debate team grabbed first place at the state tournament last weekend at Mt. Hood Community College. "We did extremely well," said coach Kelly Brennan.

The team added 24 trophies to their already outstanding 32 individual awards.

Clackamas students placed in all but one of 11 categories.

In Communication Analysis in Advertising, the Cougars swept the board with Chris Henry, first, Jenifer Gile, second and David Lee, third.

Gile also took first in Informative and was a finalist in Impromptu.

Lee had two more third place trophies in Impromptu and Extemporaneous and was a finalist in Persuasion.

Kerrie Baker-Hughes added three awards, taking third in Drama, finalist in Pro Oral Interpretation, and second in Poetry.

Laura Pimentel placed second in After Dinner Speech and was a finalist in Informative.

Amorita Patterson came home with a third place trophy in Po-

etry. Chris Henry was a finalist in Extemporaneous. Lee and Patterson took third in Duo.

The last tournament of the year will be held at Clackamas, May 4-5. Competition is scheduled Friday from 1-8:30 p.m. and Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m.

"It's usually a really fun tournament," said Brennan.

The last tournament doesn't change their official school standings but helps teams sum up their year.
