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## No solution for library air problem

After numerous tests performed on the quality of air in the Dye Learning Center last week, it has not been determined what is making staff members sick.

Concerned staff members and administrators met yesterday only to find that the amount of CO<sub>2</sub> in the air, temperature, relative humidity, carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide and particles in the air, measured by Clayton Environmental, meet OSHEA standards.

"The good news is that the building is clean and the bad news is that the building is clean. We don't know what is causing the problem," said Carol Patterson, associate dean, campus services. "It's bad news because it didn't help us at all in determining the problem."

Patterson did say that mold is not the problem.

"I spent an hour and a half in the building and I did not have my regular mold reactions," she said. "I am very confident mold is not our issue."

Jeani Preble, administrative assistant, dean of instructional services,

said she has moved three classrooms out of the building into the Gregory Forum and the modules, along with a number of staff offices. She will continue to move classrooms and offices as needed.

The library has posted signs warning anyone with allergies or asthma that they could be affected by using the facilities. Rene Zingarelli, associate dean, extending learning services said that library staff is trying to limit staff work to four hour increments. The hours at the library have been changed; they are now 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

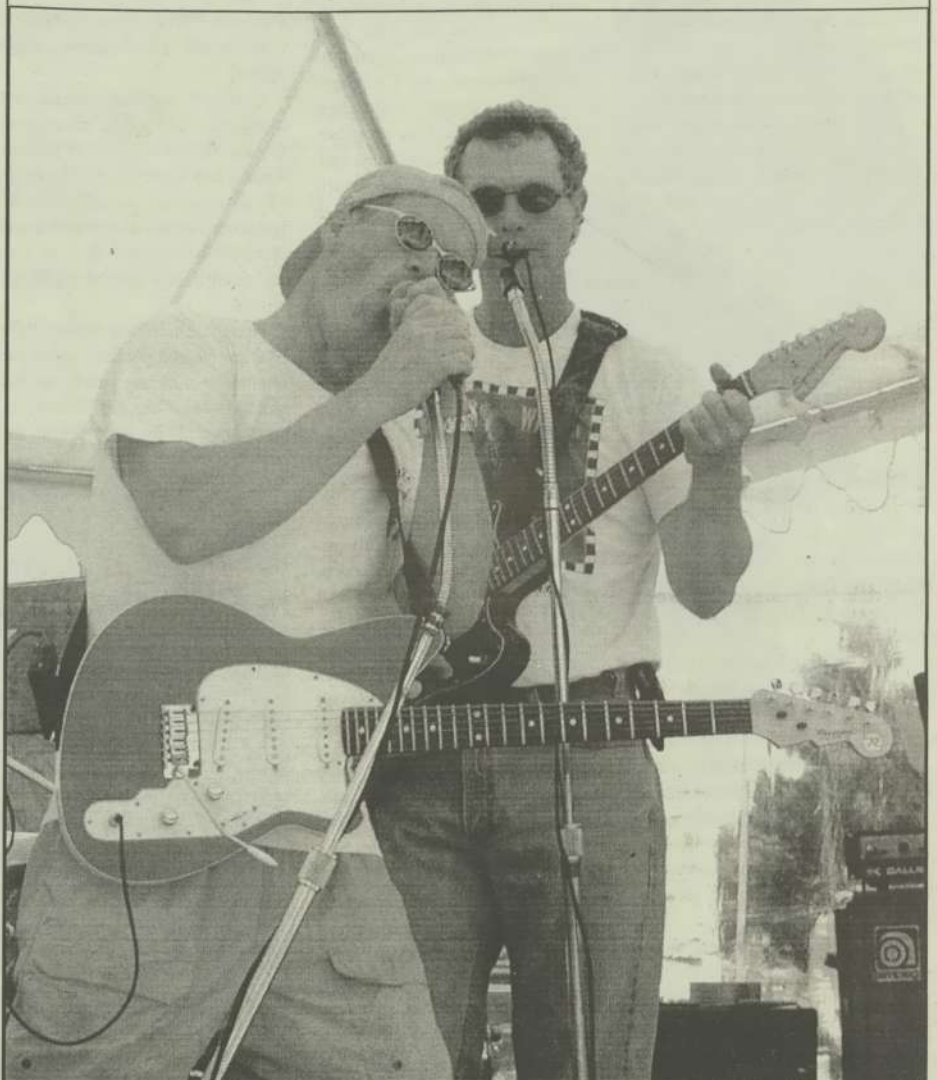
Clayton Environmental group ran tests 24 hours a day for four days to see if there was any relationship between time and possible changes in the environment.

Beginning next Wednesday, air sampling and petri dish samples will be taken throughout the building above the ceiling, in ductwork and at work level. The air sample results take three days and the petri dish test results will take 10 to 14 days.

"We're in a holding position right now and we are still trying to figure out what is going on," said
