The Lady Cougars opened NWAACC tournament play on Friday, facing the number two team from the Eastern Division, the Blue Mountain CC Timberwolves. The Cougars got a great game on the mound from Holly Marlow and defeated Blue Mountain 4-0.

Marlow tossed a one-hitter, allowing only a bunt single, while tying her school-record with 14 strikeouts and allowing only one walk. CCC got two RBIs each from Nicole Winkley and Kim Kraxberger to pace the Cougars offensively. Winkley's home run in the second staked the Cougars to a 2-0 lead, while Kraxberger smacked a solo home run in the sixth, followed by a Winkley RBI sacrifice fly to close out the Timberwolves.

Clackamas' second game on Friday saw the Cougars and the Spokane CC Sasquatch tangle in a monumental battle that saw each team take leads on the other throughout, but CCC got an RBI single from Ashley Olsen in the top of the seventh to give the Cougars a 4-3 victory.

Injured Mt. Hood climber has campus connection

The news of the 60-year-old Oregon man who plunged from a 60-foot crevasse climbing Mt. Hood May 18, hit close to home for Jan Godfrey, CCC associate dean of student services who shares family ties with the climber's brother, Geoffrey Godfrey, now recovering at Legacy Emanuel Hospital in Portland.

"My older brother and I have been very close," she said. "The sheriff called his wife in Oregon and then he called me, and my brother and Mark [his climbing partner] were to stay at our house that night. They were expected to be off the mountain by noon."

The accident occurred at 7 p.m. Jan was notified at 1 p.m. and headed to the hospital to see her brother.

"I was there when they brought him in from the mountain. He survived an amazing

"It was a successful event and a successful rescue," Jan said. "I brought all his hiking clothes home from the hospital ... they were absolutely soaking wet. He had been laying in these [clothes] for an amazing

amount of time."

The fall knocked the retired sixth grade teacher unconscious and when he came to, he would spend over an hour without any human contact.

"When Geoff called out to let his partner know that he was OK, there was no voice back, so he didn't know what had happened—an hour and a half not knowing was very awful," Jan said. "He thought that he was likely to die there because he was so wedged in and he did not know what had happened to his friend. He didn't know if [Mark] had fallen down the crevasse with him. [Geoff] had no idea if there was

anybody to help him [or] if there were any rescue efforts."

Geoff suffered a punctured bladder and broken bones in his pelvis, ribs and face.

"His face took a huge beating," Jan said.

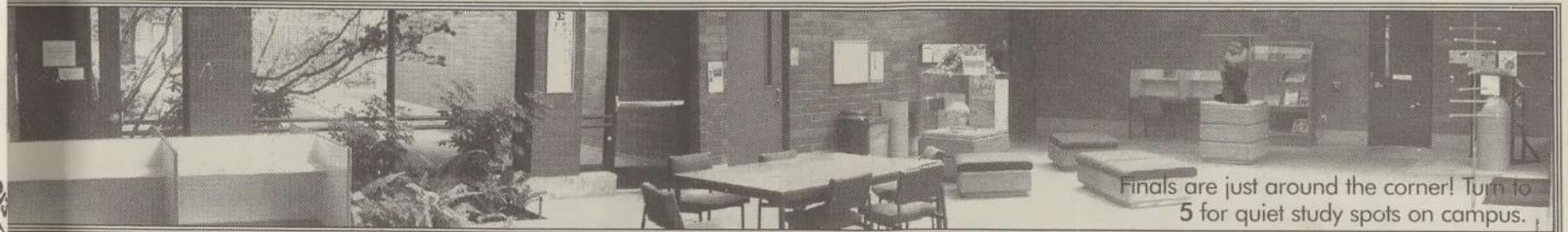
After having two surgeries on Saturday, Geoff is experiencing more difficulty than anticipated due to the severity of his fractures.

"He's had a bit of a setback," said Jan. "The injuries were more extensive than they originally thought."

More surgeries are expected for the future and rehabilitation
