"Prize-Winning Fiction" is the theme of the winter term **Authors' Night at CCC, Wednesday, Feb. 23, 7 to 9**



Did you know that a STEM CELL is essentially the building block of the human body? Stem cells exist inside an embryo that has developed for three to five days, called a blastocyst. Adults also have stem cells in the heart, brain, bone marrow, lungs and other organs. Unlike a regular cell, which can only replicate to create more of its own kind of cell, a stem cell is PLURIPOTENT. When it divides, it can make any one of the 220 different cells in the human body! Stem cells also have the capability to self-renew — they can reproduce themselves many times over. Imagine having the ability to return memory to an Alzheimer's patient, replace skin that was lost during an accident or enable a wheelchair-bound person to walk again. Their almost limitless potential have made stem cells a significant focus of medical research and intense debate.
