With so many students readying for graduation, retiring staff and faculty are often forgotten. This year, thirteen staff members are leaving.

Alice Hayden, a math instructor for 25 years, is leaving this June to spend more time with her family, including her twin granddaughters.

Bill Symes is another 25-year veteran who is getting ready to leave Clackamas to "get a real job." Starting in 1980, he worked as a public information specialist, publications manager and director of marketing until in 1994 when he made the switch to teaching in the business department.

Manufacturing Instructor **Jeff Molatore** has spent the last 27 years working for Clackamas, originally starting as a welding instructor in 1977. He is now in Europe, visiting his daughter, an English teacher in Krakow, Poland.

Eric Faucher, Youth Services Transition adviser, has worked at Clackamas since 1992. In 1996 he was named the Teacher of the Year for the Oregon Association of Special Needs Personnel. In addition to doing "odd jobs" around the campus, Faucher plans to complete training to become a

court-appointed special advocate trainer for the State of Oregon.

Automotive Instructor **Jim Neufeld** is leaving this spring after teaching at Clackamas for 10 years. When asked of his feelings on the past 10 years, he remembers "happy times, times filled with stresses too heavy to be remembered and sad times that changed the ways we looked at the world in which we live." Neufeld has sold his home and has purchased a home on the bay in Waldport. He hopes to travel more often and reconnect with friends abroad.

Kay Slusarenko, dean of arts, humanities and social sciences, will be leaving after a 7-year stint at Clackamas. Some of her favorite moments here include envisioning both the Studio Arts Center and the Niemeyer Center. Another proud moment in her career at CCC was influencing the freedom to paint administrative offices in colors other than white. During her retirement, she plans to spend more time with her husband and three sons, as well as put more time into her art with the hopes of opening a gallery soon.

Executive Director of the CCC Foundation **David Dickson** is also retiring this year after a 25-year run. Starting as the coordinator of community development in 1980, he was named as the economic development officer three years

later. It was in the late '80s that he took his role as director of the Foundation. He was known to be one of the greatest fundraisers for Clackamas, raising millions of dollars for the school, including the \$3 million Campaign for the Arts.

Dean of Business Services **Roxie Hobart** is leaving after 30 years here at CCC. She began as a cashier, but went on to oversee the business office, purchasing, the cashier's office, the bookstore, duplication, food service, investments, budgeting, motor pool, shipping and receiving, and mail services. In retirement, she plans on doing bookkeeping for a family business, along with some traveling.

Larry Levi, dean of applied technology, has worked at Clackamas for the last 20 years. He began as a work-study student in the Veterans' Office, but moved to the Registrar's Office in 1985. His future plans include visiting family, traveling, fishing, golfing and gambling. He is also considering a move to Hawaii to be closer to his wife's family.

Joseph Kattanick, a Campus Services veteran of 12 years, is also leaving and plans to travel to New York to visit friends and family. He would also like to spend more time reading, fishing and working on cars. Starting in 1993, Kattanick lists his favorite

memory of Clackamas as working together with other staff members to help the campus recover after the flood in 1996.

Executive Assistant to Dean of Instruction **Jeani Preble** is leaving CCC after 28 years. Beginning in the work-study program applied for a temporary secretary position in 1977. She eventually became a fulltime employee working in an array of departments before landing her present position years ago.

Janet Quinn, another retiree has worked here for 20 years. Beginning in 1985 as a custodian on the graveyard shift, she is now in the Shipping and Receiving department. She's looking forward to traveling around the Pacific Northwest and down to California to visit her parents, but is going to miss all the people.

"I had a good job where I met a lot of people," said Quinn. "There are a lot of good people here."

Moma Escriva will be retiring this spring after five years as a department secretary. Her future plans include traveling, taking classes, volunteer work and singing.

The retirees were honored at a Retirement Celebration held May 19.

Clackamas students who have completed their requirements will be graduating on Thursday and Friday, June 9 and 10.

On Thursday, June 9, at 7 p.m., the GED and Adult High School Diploma ceremony will be held in the Randall Gym. It is expected that approximately

200 people will be participating in this year's GED and High School Diploma graduation ceremony.

There is a rehearsal on Wednesday, June 8, from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the Randall Gym, but it is not mandatory.

On Friday, June 10, at 7 p.m., the commencement ceremony will be held for all Clackamas Community College graduates. These are students who have completed

the requirements for whatever degree they have been working towards. This year's graduating class is expected to consist of at least 250 students.

There will be a rehearsal on Thursday, June 9, from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the Randall Gym; participants are not required to be there, but it is encouraged.

After both the high school and college graduation cer-

emonies, a reception will be held in the Gregory Forum where everyone can enjoy cookies and punch and socialize with friends and family.
