"Fairchild, who is the gardener at the Leach Botanical Garden, is one of the speakers," said Howely. "He is just going to knock folks' socks off, providing them with information about growing great plants from seeds and cuttings."

"Beutler, one of our part-time faculty members in the Horticulture Department, is an amazing user of plants in the garden for striking arrangements inside, as well as great combinations outside," she added.

Beutler will also be talking about gardening in the winter.

"White is going to talk about container gardening," said Howely. "Lots of people like gardens on their decks or front parkways."

Admission is \$7. Interested parties can register at the door or call Lorretta Mills, the department secretary, and pre-register.

The next event will be a fruit tree pruning demonstration from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Sat., Feb. 10 at the Clackamas Home Orchard Society Arboretum.

Attendees are asked to bring their own pruning tools. The fee is \$10, and pre-registration is encouraged.

Following the demonstration, there will be fruit tree grafting workshops in Clairmont Hall, Room 118, on Sat., Feb. 24.

The first of the two events runs from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. and will offer practice in whip grafting.

The second event takes place from 12:45 p.m. to 2:15 p.m. and will cover grafting methods like cleft, kerf and inarching.

The organizers ask that those attending bring their own straight-edged knives to both events.

The fee for both events is \$15.

Howely assures that novices are welcome right alongside seasoned gardeners at all the events.

"That's what these are all about," said Howely. "It's people that are very skilled and people that just want to start to begin their skill-building."

## Gardening Terms for the Novice

**Graft:** a bud, shoot, or scion of a plant inserted in a groove, slit, or the like in a stem or stock of another plant in which it continues to grow.

**Scion:** a shoot or twig, especially one cut for grafting or planting; a cutting.

**Cleft:** (of a leaf, corolla, lobe, or other expanded plant part) having divisions formed by incisions or narrow sinuses that extend more than halfway to the midrib or the base.

**Kerf:** a cut or incision made by a saw or the like in a piece of wood.

**Inarching:** To graft by uniting, as a scion, to a stock, without separating either from its root before the union is complete.

## BOND: Saves taxpayers' money, upgrades campus

"Timing is dependent on the interest rates in the market changing by a large enough margin to make the savings worthwhile," said Dierdorff.

When market conditions were good to refinance, federal offices were closed to honor the death of Former President Gerald Ford, creating a higher demand for bond sales. At the time of the sale, there was only one other bond sale available nationwide. Because of this, the amount of money the college saved went up, according to Dierdorff.

Northwest Investment Bank coordinated the bond sale and helped secure the lower interest

rate," said Dierdorff. As required by law, the process was overseen by an adviser, Charles Carter Co.

In November 2000, Clackamas County voters approved the \$47 million bond measure. The money from the bond financed six new buildings and upgrades for old buildings at the college.

While the refinancing has no direct financial impact on the college, Dierdorff says it sends a good message to Clackamas County taxpayers:

"It is helpful in future bond campaigns to remind the voters that we are good stewards of their money."
